

## **ACTIVITY REPORT October to November 2022**

### Mandates and responsibilities:

- Fishing and Trapping Support Program: overall program administration, technical assistance to Community programs and management of the regional program;
  - Uumajuit Wardens Program: wildlife protection on the land in the marine sectors;
  - Environmental Program: technical assistance to the Northern Villages, environmental monitoring, research, climate change and environmental projects;
  - Land Use Planning: technical assistance to the Northern Villages and regional planning;
  - National Parks development and operation.

### **1. INUIT HUNTING, FISHING AND TRAPPING SUPPORT PROGRAM**

- Update on the community boat inspections: due to unavailability of inspectors, this will only resume in July 2023 which will include repairs to the boats that need it;
- Freezer inspections: we are in the process of doing a technical specification and due to lack of interest, we might have to go a different route on the inspections;
- The Scallop Dragging boat for Tasiujaq will be done in March 2023 and set sail early July 2023;
- The barge for Kuujjuaraapik: all material have been received and will be finished and stored in December for the first sealift, trailer is done;
- The Nunavik Land Mobile Radio projects: the supplies have arrived in the 4 communities, they will start with Kangirsuk and Quaqtac since they will need a chopper, Tasiujaq and Aupaluk will be next;
- Community visits to Umiujaq, Ivujivik, Akulivik and Kangirsuk were delayed due to bad weather and hotel problems.

### **2. UUMAJUIT WARDENS PROGRAM**

- As of the end of October, the wardens completed 756 patrol-days and 13 days of search and rescue assistance;
- Weekly telephone meetings with Quebec Wildlife Protection Officers (MFFP) DFO representatives and all wardens are active and ongoing;
- Statistics reporting on Beluga sightings and harvests along with monitoring of hunting on a daily basis, ongoing with each warden;
- Negotiations ongoing for the new Nunavik Indigenous Guardians for the Uumajuit wardens to get extra funding;
- Participated in the monthly meetings of the KRG/DFO Liaison committee;
- Joint patrol with MFFP and Uumajuit wardens in some communities;
- Recruitment for a warden in Aupaluk is ongoing;
- Kuujjuaq warden resigned and recruitment now going for a replacement;
- Refresher courses held first week of October;
- DFO officers will be patrolling in Nunavik in December, their first since the pandemic started: 8 communities will be visited, total patrolling in Nunavik will be 10 days.

### 3. ENVIRONMENT

#### Residual Material Management

- KRG was confirmed the funding from the MELCC for the waste management projects in progress :
  - Additional amount of 1,865 million \$ for metal recycling;
  - 1,812 million \$ for Eco centre (Kuujjuaq);
  - 1,170 million \$ for composter (Inukjuak);
  - 546 377\$ for recycling facility (Kangiqsualujjuaq);
- Metal recycling project in Kangirsuk: at the end of October, most of metal accumulated at Kangirsuk was treated (2500 compressed bales of bulky metal, 150 vehicles and 30 heavy machinery). The retrograde sealift operations are planned for beginning of November;
- Training for Municipal Managers and employees on waste management and landfill operations was held in Kuujjuaq on November 15, 16 and 17;
- Waste to Energy project in Kuujjuaq: virtual meeting was held on September 16 with the SPN, Tarquti and MERN for a possibility of partnership for the feasibility study of the district heating portion of the project;
- Eco centre project in Kuujjuaq: preparation of the pad has begun in September, concrete blocks and fence were received and a call for tenders to buy modified containers was launched;
- Composting project: preparation of the pad for the composting site was completed;
- Funding requests have been submitted for the region under new Recyc-Quebec program for supporting remote areas in Quebec including the construction of new infrastructure for storage of end-of-life vehicles and the transport/recycling of heavy machinery used tires;
- Follow-up on summer recycling operations: 22 marine containers 20" of used tires, 35 container-bins of used paint, 3 containers 20" of appliances, 50 quatrex bags of vehicle batteries, 1 container 20" of electronics and 340 of used-oil barrels.

#### Spill Management

- During the reporting period, 37 spills were reported to the KRG: 16 from mining companies and 21 reported or observed from regional organizations;
- Of the 21 spills from regional organizations, 13 were reported by KRG's environmental specialist;
- Environmental prevention inspections were undertaken in Quaqtaq, Aupaluk, Kangigsujuaq, Inukjuak, Umiujaq, Puvirnituq and Kuujjuaq on heating oil tanks and drums to identify leaks or possible non-compliance; the owner of the buildings have been contacted;
- Discussion with the MELCC and Kativik Ilisarniliriniq about their contaminated sites. Some sites have been rehabilitated this year. Also, KI have developed an action plan to change their defective oil tanks;
- Discussion with the MELCC and FCNQ Construction about a contaminated site at Puvirnituq. FCNQ received a notice of non-conformity for nine environmental non-compliances. A follow-up will be done by the MELCC and KRG;
- Meeting with KEAC and MELCC about The 2022–2027 action plan for contaminated soil under the Soil Protection and Contaminated Sites Rehabilitation Program and draft *Regulation respecting Charges to Promote the Treatment and Reclamation of Excavated Contaminated Soils*. A committee will be put in place to take into account the needs of Nunavik.

### **Quarry and Borrow Pits**

- The northern villages of Kuujjuaq and Quaqtaq applied to the MERN funding program *Sand Pit and Gravel Pit Rehabilitation Financial Assistance Program to Accelerate the Development of Public Land* to restore sandpits in their community. Restoration work are planned for the summer and fall of 2023.

### **Climate Change Adaptation and Monitoring**

- Phase 2 of fieldwork was held in the NV of Kangiqsualujjuaq, from September 17<sup>th</sup> to 21<sup>st</sup>, for the pilot project: “Characterization of wetlands and water environments in Nunavik” with the consultant, KRG and MELCC.

### **Environmental Research**

The Inuit Research Advisor (IRA) participated to:

- Virtual meeting with Liliana Gomez Cardona regarding “VR Therapy Project” from Douglas Mental Health Institute research team. The aim was to be working on the development of a psychotherapy, with a virtual reality (VR) immersion component.
- Meeting with Environment and Climate Change Canada: the objective of the meeting was going through research proposals that are coming from Nunavik Region.
- Virtual meeting - Qanuippitaa? National Inuit Health Survey on October 18 and 19: progress report of the health surveys; Steering/Data Management Committee on usage and access to collected data/samples from previous surveys.

### **Regional Environment**

#### Caniapiscau Watershed Abandoned Outfitting Camp Clean-up:

- Inspection of mobile outfitting camps clean-up projects in the Caniapiscau watershed was done in collaboration with MFFP agent and Naskapi Nation representative on September 13-15.
- For the planning of the 2023-2025 fieldwork campaigns, communication to the owners of all the permanent outfitting camps in Caniapiscau watershed area was done at beginning of November in order to offer them technical assistance for taking in charge the hazardous waste accumulated on their sites;

#### Nunavik Abandoned Mineral Exploration Sites Restoration:

- Rehabilitation work was completed during the week of September 26 in Dupuy Lake, 70 km south-west from the community of Kuujjuaq with the collaboration of ten local workers; roughly 4000 kg of wasted material was hauled by helicopter to Kuujjuaq where it will be transported by sealift to a southern recycling facility; this clean-up complete the work plan of the last 15 years

## **4. LAND USE PLANNING**

### **Regional Planning**

- Letters of Conformity: during this period, 3 projects of Land use occupations were approved;
- During 3 inspection sessions, a total of 38 sites have been inspected :
  - 5 recreational leases;
  - 6 outfitting camps;
  - 27 exploration camps;Of these 38 sites:
  - 19 sites were abandoned or appeared abandoned;

- 6 sites have been dismantled, one of them still have lot of drums;
- Following Makivik Corporation comments, the proposed amendments to the Kativik Act have been revised to include their comments. The revised amendments were sent to Makivik Corporation at the beginning of November with a letter of explanation on what could and could not be included;
- A virtual meeting with the Kativik Regional Advisory Committee and the Nunavik Landholding Corporation Association was held on:
  - September 6<sup>th</sup> to discuss their main comments on the Kativik Region Zoning Bylaw;
  - October 17<sup>th</sup> to present a new proposal for the chapter 5 of the Kativik Region Zoning Bylaw.

### **Municipal Planning, Expansion Plans and Technical Assistance Program**

- Technical assistance was provided to: Salluit, Kangiqsujaq, Umiujaq, Inukjuak, Kuujjuaq and Quaqtaq for consistent integration of construction projects into NV land use plans;
- Presentation of long-term investment plan by the NRBHSS was presented to KRG Land use section and MPW for evaluating the needs in planning and infrastructure;
- Land use planning team met with the NV of Ivujivik for the preparation of the master plan update draft and the NV of Tasiujaq for the update the master plan map;
- Master plan update drafts were prepared for Kangiqsujaq, Ivujivik, and Quaqtaq;
- Planning and coordinating the community's expansion areas for 2023-2024, the land use planning team met with the NVs of Tasiujaq, Ivujivik and Kangiqsujaq and with Makivik construction.

## **5. PROTECTED AREAS**

### **20% Protected Areas**

- Information session on the upcoming public consultations on protected areas in Nunavik was launch at the last KRG Regional Council in September. Since then, several posts have been made on the Facebook page to inform people about protected areas in Nunavik and several communications have been distributed to inform people of the consultations;
- Several consultations tool were developed and prepared with the consultant MU Conseils and were deployed during the first consultations;
- Public consultations on Protected Areas in Nunavik started in November. Five communities were consulted during the first round of consultations:
  - Kuujjuaq on November 1 to 4;
  - Aupaluk on November 7;
  - Kangirsuk on November 9 to 10;
  - Tasiujaq on November 14, and;
  - Kangiqsualujjuaq on November 17 to 18.

*\*Other Inuit communities, Kawawachikamach and Whapmagoostui will be consulted in the winter and spring of 2023;*
- Specific Agreement to preserve the Cambrien Lake / Nachicapau Lake / Fort Mackenzie (Waskaikinis) Areas:
  - Participated in a meeting of the Subcommittee on the search for alternatives to hydroelectric power development in the area covered by the Agreement on September 15;
  - Participation in working sessions with the Naskapi Nation of Kawawachikamach and the MELCC representatives for the production of Cambrien / Nachicapau Status Report;
  - Drafting of the report on the wildlife component of the 2022 fieldwork campaign in

the Cambrien and Nachicapau lakes sector.

## **6. PARKS**

### **General**

- Visitor experience meeting was held in Kuujjuaq on October 18 and 19. Subject discussed were debrief on 2022, planning 2023, training and discussion on the vision for the upcoming years;
- Nunavik Parks management annual meeting was held in Kuujjuaq November 1 to 3. Subjects discussed were a debrief on 2022, 2023 objectives and planning, discussions on health and safety, human resources, budgets and residual material management action plan;
- Nunavik Parks' Kuujjuaq team took a day on the land to debrief 2022 and discuss 2023;
- Nunavik Parks 2023 summer packages dates and prices were released;
- Jennifer Simard was hired as a visitor experience technician;
- Lucile Drouineau resigned as a coordinator management. The hiring is underway.

### **Pingualuit**

- There were 86 visitors in the park and 30 at the visitor center during this period;
- A helicopter was chartered for the closing and maintenance of camps. Installation of educational panels in all 7 camps was finished;
- Warden and conservation and educational specialist participated with Quebec Wildlife Protection Officers in a patrol;
- Environmental monitoring was done in September including water sampling in 4 stations in the park (Manarsulik, Vachon, Puvirnituk East and Puvirnituk West);
- Park's employees took their annual day trip by boat to Tursukattak/Qanattalik, where the potential park extension is;
- Nunavik Park maintenance technician spent a week in Kangiqsujaq in October to assist the team in their work and with planning and inventory.

### **Kuururjuaq**

- There were 34 visitors in the park and 41 at the visitor center during this period;
- Park director met with Université du Québec à Rimouski in coastal science and on topics related to coastal erosion and coastal flooding in Nunavik and Nunavut. A meeting was also done with Laval University research team for next season's request for research inside the park;
- Environmental monitoring was done in September including water sampling in the Korok river to complete the 2022 data collection and retrieving material for the biodiversity monitoring project, work on the permafrost monitoring project set up and work on the MinaNor monitoring project by replacing loggers to monitor climate change impacts;
- Conservation and education specialist worked in collaboration with the UQTR team on their teledetection project, a vegetation survey, in September in the Korok and Qurlutuarjuq areas;
- Warden and conservation and educational specialist participated with Quebec Wildlife Protection Officers in a patrol;
- A wild fire occurred in the Korok valley on June 9, located approximately 10 km from the Qurlutuarjuq camp and 75 km east of the community. Fire was declared extinguished by the Sopheu on June 13. An estimated 113 ha of forest burned;
- Purchase of a new pick up for the park's operations. Delivery was on the last sea lift;

- 2 weather stations were installed at Head of the Koroc airstrip and at Korluktok Falls airstrip in September. The data will soon be available online to increase safety when accessing that area of the park. A partnership regarding the transmission of the data is underway;
- A helicopter was chartered in September to Kuururjuaq for the closing, maintenance of camps and the airstrip, sling material and proceed with conservation & environmental work.

### **Ulittaniujalik**

- There were 12 visitors in the park during this period;
- Environmental monitoring conducted by the Conservation and education specialist;
- Warden and conservation and educational specialist participated with Quebec Wildlife Protection Officers in a patrol. The helicopter flew over the park and its boundaries for a total of 370 km. During those flights, Conservation specialist sampled the George River for water quality.
- On September 24, 2022, Nunavik Parks employees from Kangiqsualujuaq and Kuujuaq accompanied 7 representatives of the Naskapi Nation of Kawawachikamach to park national Ulittaniujalik to conduct helicopter reconnaissance flights. The group was able to share stories of the Naskapi occupation of the territory, identify sites of possible archaeological interest and learn about the history of the Naskapi people. This outing was conducted in order to collect data for a mobile exhibit for Ulittaniujalik in Kawawachikamach.

### **Tursujuq**

- There were 34 visitors in the park and 138 at the visitor center during this period;
- Between August and October, Tursujuq park had 2 full packages and 2 local community packages;
- Tursujuq team patrolled in the park and fresh water seal sampling at the same time by helicopter in mid-August;
- In mid-August, park's Conservation Specialist and park's warden carried on monitoring for endangered freshwater seals by sampling water at 11 locations in Tursujuq for environmental DNA. Results should be available soon;
- Warden and conservation and educational specialist participated with Quebec Wildlife Protection Officers in a patrol. The helicopter flew over the park and its boundaries for a total of 1200 km in 3 days. During those flights, Conservation specialist sampled the Nastapoka River and Isuanit – North River for water quality;
- Purchase of a brand new 24' freighter canoe at the Coop;
- Purchase of a new pick up for the park's operations. Delivery was done on the last sea lift;
- Multiple trips by Twin Otter were done from CEN airstrip to Umiujaq to retrieve material from the clean up project conducted by Nancy Dea. This project is now finished;
- Harmonization committee meeting was held in Umiujaq on October 5. Some subjects discussed include the approval of the mandate of harmonization committee members, a presentation of conservation work results for 2022, summary of summer operations, park expansion project and zoning plan, discussion on the park's 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary planning for 2023, presentation of the residual material management action plan, promotion of good camp usage practices in the park and the onset of a monitoring program for beluga whales within the park in agreement to the mandate associated to the creation of the park. The members were invited for a lunch in the park the following day;
- A new office for the park was inaugurated in Kuujuaapik in September. An exhibition is under development and will be launched in 2023;

- Assistant director, park director and education specialist visited the communities of Whapmagoostui and Kuujjuaraapik to inquire about community needs and ideas for the permanent Parc national Tursujuq exhibit in the new Sakkuk Landholding building. They met with representatives from the Whapmagoostui First Nation, N.V. of Kuujjuaraapik, Nunavik Hunting, Fishing and Trapping Organization Anguviaq and teachers from Asimauttaq School. They visited the new office and interviews were passed for the VEO position;
- The park's team participated in a community event in Umiujaq for National Day for Truth and Reconciliation by offering a BBQ;
- Vanessa Aragutak was hired as a visitor experience officer in Kuujjuaraapik;
- Hiring of visitor experience officer in Umiujaq as well as in Kuujjuaraapik is underway.
