



ACTIVITY REPORT
RENEWABLE RESOURCES, ENVIRONMENT, LANDS AND PARKS
SEPTEMBER-NOVEMBER 2023

Mandates and responsibilities:

- Fishing and Trapping Support Program: overall program administration, technical assistance to Community programs and management of the regional program;
- Uumajuit Wardens Program: wildlife protection on the land in the marine sectors;
- Environmental Program: technical assistance to the Northern Villages, environmental monitoring, research, climate change and environmental projects;
- Land Use Planning: technical assistance to the Northern Villages and regional planning;
- National Parks development and operation.

1. INUIT HUNTING, FISHING AND TRAPPING SUPPORT PROGRAM

- Reminders to all of the communities were emailed regarding community HSP general ledgers, it is very important that they send these quarterly reports;
- The construction of a landing barge for Kuujjuaraapik is stored away and will arrive by sealift next summer;
- The new fishing vessel is not on tender, we should know more in the coming weeks if it will be done for next summer;
- We are also in the process for a fishing vessel for Salluit;
- The Nunavik Land Mobile Radio project is now completed, we have budgeted for six (6) communities up to \$50,000 to upgrade their shelters;
- The community freezer for Quaqtaq had no room on sealift this season so it will arrive in 2024;
- Renovation of Community Freezers: we have budgeted for three (3) communities (Aupaluk, Kangirsuk and Ivujivik);
- A contribution agreement with Tarquti Energy corp. is underway that will see solar powered generators delivered for sale in each community. These will be for the Hunters that have camps outside the community.

2. UUMAJUIT WARDENS PROGRAM

- In 2023 so far 952 days of patrol days with nine (9) days search and rescue assistance to Municipalities.
- Regular Weekly telephone meetings held with Quebec Wildlife Protection Officers (MFFP) DFO representatives, and all wardens are active and ongoing.
- Statistics reporting on Beluga sightings and harvests along with monitoring of hunting daily harvests, ongoing with each warden.
- As part of the Nunavik Indigenous Guardians Initiative, the Wardens continue to document and report observations on environmental and climate changes on the land.
- Participated in the monthly meetings of the KRG/DFO Liaison committee.
- Recruitment for a warden in Aupaluk is on-going.
- A candidate was hired for the vacant warden position in Kuujjuaq.
- DFO officers patrolled with our wardens in some communities and are ongoing.
- Statistics compiled and updated and submitted.
- Planning of updating communications equipment still in progress, wardens used the In-

reach device as a form of communication, looking at newer systems such as the PTT satellite phones,

- Some technical issues that we're working on for all wardens to submit weekly reports as some communities haven't been submitting their reports, this is being worked on by the IT department and the warden.
- On-going work with different departments of MFFP for research studies with our wardens assisting in communities and visits, retrieval of equipment in the process now in the communities,
- A Refresher was held in Kuujjuaq at the end of October with two (2) days with DFO and a one(1) day with MFFP, we also got to tour the DFO Dash 8 at the Kuujjuaq airport.
- Preparing 2024 tender process(four (4) snowmachines and four(4)4 ATV's) for the communities. Finalizing list of priorities with machine conditions in each community, machines will be sent by sealift Summer 2024.

3. ENVIRONMENT

Residual Material Management

- Metal recycling project was completed in Aupaluk in October. Approximately 800 tons of metal were treated including the decontamination of end-of-life vehicles (80 vehicles and 15 heavy machinery), everything has been shipped south on the last sealift. In Kangirsuk, 12 open top containers were sent south (144 tons) with the last sealift. All KRG equipment for metal recycling has arrived in Quaqtac (baler, excavator, skytrack, garage) in preparation for 2024, next year the project will be done in-house with KRG equipment and staff in collaboration with the Northern Village;
- 2023 Recycling programs in Nunavik: approximately 500 tons of recyclable materials will have been sent to southern facilities from Northern Villages:
 - 35 containers of used tires (regular tires and heavy machinery tires);
 - 20 metal bins of used paint;
 - 7 containers of used oil;
 - 3 containers of used electronics;
 - 4 containers of refrigerant appliances;
 - 20 Quatex bags of vehicle batteries;
- Construction of Kuujjuaq ecocenter site began in June with machinery of the NV Kuujjuaq and KRG supervision. The equipment of the second-hand store arrived. A training was given to NV employees and an operation guide for the ecocenter was prepared. The operation will start during winter 2024;
- Recycling Drop-off points (Kangiqsualujjuaq and Kangiqsujuaq): the equipment arrived with the 1st sealift. Site construction in both villages are completed;
- End-of-life-vehicle site in Quaqtac: the construction of the site was completed in September and the fence was installed in November. The employees of the municipal garage will receive training on how to decontaminate the vehicle. The decontamination units for metal project and end-of-life project were purchased and will be shipped next year;
- Composting project In Inukjuak: The equipment arrived and the installation was completed at the end of October. An awareness campaign started within the community early November and the training for municipal employees was done in mid-November by the supplier in collaboration with the KRG. The collection should start at the end of November for the stores and organizations

Granular Material Management

- Gravel site restoration:
 - Restoration of three (3) sites in Puvirnituq, for a total of 2.85 hectares in collaboration with the Northern Village. First attempt in Nunavik of the “rough and loose” method in order to accelerate the revegetation of abandoned gravel sites;
 - Restoration of seven (7) sites in Quaqtuaq, for a total of 10.94 hectares in collaboration with the Northern Village. The final report have been done by the KRG in order for the NV to receive their final payment from MRNF;
- Gravel site inventory in Inukjuak: characterization of two (2) potential new sites was done in September in collaboration with the Northern Village operators.

Spill Management

- During the reporting period, twenty-seven (27) spills were reported to the KRG: seventeen (17) from mining companies and ten (10) reported or observed from regional organizations;
- Puvirnituq: Verification of remediation work on a lot used by FCNQ Construction from 2016 to 2022. Over 500 m³ of contaminated soil has been excavated;
- Ivujivik: Follow-up to the 2020 spill at the Ivujivik pumping station (FCNQ Petro). The work will continue in 2024;
- Mid Canada Line: Sampling work at sites 315A and 330A in collaboration with INRS. New areas of contamination were identified;
- Discussion with Kativik Ilisarniliriniq regarding their contaminated sites in the 14 communities. Several heating oil tanks have been replaced since the beginning of the year;
- Environmental prevention inspections were undertaken in Akulivik, Ivujivik, Inukjuak, Kangiqsualujuaq, Kuujuaq, Kuujuaaraapik, Puvirnituq, Salluit and Umiujaq on heating oil tanks and drums to identify leaks or possible non-compliance. The owners of the buildings have been contacted;
- Visits in the villages of Inukjuak and Kuujuaaraapik from October 25 to 28 with MELCCFP. Several sites have been inspected.

Environmental Research and monitoring

- Participated in Attaniuvik Steering committee meetings on September 26 and October 25;
- The maintenance of ice monitoring camera was done in September and October in Kuujuaaraapik, Umiujaq, Ivujivik and Aupaluk and the maintenance of the weather station in Deception Bay was done on October 26;
- As part of a pan-Arctic research program from Environment Canada (EC), the “Persistent Organic Pollutant” and Mercury samplers were changed in September. The sampling site is located about 25 km north of Kuujuaq.

Regional Environment

Caniapiscau Watershed Abandoned Outfitting Camp Clean-up:

- Clean-up of hazardous waste and dismantlement of two (2) permanent outfitting camps were done between September 1-6 with local workers from Kuujuaq and help from Umiujaq fieldwork Coordinator;
- Initial agreement with ECCC has officially been prolonged to 2026.

Nunavik Abandoned Mineral Exploration Sites Restoration:

- The NAMERS project was presented at XPLOR conference on November 2 where the partners of this agreement received a recognition award. The presentation was also done at Quebec Mines Conference on November 20;
- A promotional video is being produced to mark the end of this partnership agreement, which have cleaned up nearly 130 abandoned mining exploration sites since 2007;
- A communication plan was finalized to promote the results of the project;
- Comments have been provided to the MRNF for the new bylaw on impact mining exploration activities;
- KRG assisted in meetings with the MRNF to ensure the flow of information about mining projects and activities in the region (Table sur les activités minières, consultation sur le développement harmonieux des activités minières, etc.)
- Follow-ups have been done with the MRNF and Canadian Royalties concerning the remediation of the Chrysler Camp;
- Discussions with Harfang Mining compagnie have happened concerning the remediation of abandoned mining camp on Lac Aulneau;
- On October 17, a brief was sent to the Ministry of Natural Resources in collaboration with the KEAC concerning the Regulation to amend the Regulation respecting mineral substances other than petroleum, natural gas, and brine;

Mid-Canada Line:

- Agreement to develop a workplan for the clean-up of sites 315A and 330A have been signed between the MELCC and KRG;
- A survey has been done on September 19-20 to overview the two (2) sites that KRG will need to restore; this fieldwork will help framing the action plan for the coming agreement with MELCCFP. Were also present during this fieldwork with some In-Situ soil decontamination experts because these sites have been highly impacted by hydrocarbon spills and are only accessible by aircraft;
- Contacts have been made with potential service providers on the clean-up contract coming up next summer;
- Fuel was delivered to ensure access to the sites in 2024.

4. LAND USE PLANNING

Regional Planning

- Working session took place October 2-4 in Montreal to finalize the zoning bylaw for the Kativik Region and integrate the regional stakeholders comments, the bylaw should be ready for adoption at the next Regional Council meeting;
- Letters of Conformity: during this period, three (3) projects of Land use occupations were approved.

Municipal Planning, Expansion Plans and Technical Assistance Program

- Technical assistance was provided to: Quaqtac, Salluit, Umiujaq, Inukjuak, Ivujivik, Kangiqsujuaq and Kuujuaq for analyzing and planning new construction projects;
- Planning and coordinating the community's expansion areas for the 2024 social housing allocation for Ivujivik, Salluit, Kangiqsualujuaq and Aupaluk in collaboration with MPW and Makivvik Construction;
- Community base maps were updated for Kuujuaq, Salluit, Ivujivik and Kangiqsualujuaq;

- Beginning of studies in Quaqtaq regarding the icing natural hazard on the banks of the river; map will be produced and integrated into the community comprehensive plan;
- Geotechnical and geophysical surveys have been completed in Salluit and Kangiqsualujuaq new expansion areas in order to feed the preliminary plans for these zones;
- Preliminary version of the Kuujjuaraapik, Ivujivik and Kangiqsujuaq master plans have been presented to the NVs in September and October for comments;
- Meetings with the Northern Village of Puvirnituk on October 3 and November 8 concerning their master plan revision and to present the upcoming consultation process;
- Drafting of the comprehensive community plan of Kangirsuk, Tasiujaq and Puvirnituk was initiated with an external land use firm;
- Initiating the steps to put in place an interactive platform of planning tools and permit emissions in collaboration with the Nunavik Land Holding Corporation Association.

5. PROTECTED AREAS

- Participated in the second information session, virtually, on November 2 regarding Quebec government's Nature Plan to protect 30% of the province lands and water by 2030; the "indigenous conservation areas" will be added to the different status of protection that the region can put in place in the coming years;
- On October 20, a brief was sent to the Ministry of Environment in collaboration with the KEAC concerning the Amendments to the Act respecting threatened or vulnerable species, the Natural Heritage Conservation Act and the Act respecting the conservation and development of wildlife;

20% Protected Areas

- Finalization of the report and its summary version for the phase one (1) of the consultations on protected areas in Nunavik by the consultant: documents will be translated and then shared with the communities and organizations;
- Holding Advisory Committee meetings to plan phase 2 for consultations on protected areas in Nunavik;
- Specific Agreement to preserve the Cambrien Lake / Nachicapau Lake / Fort Mackenzie (Waskaikinis) Areas:
 - Participation in a meeting of the Subcommittee on the implementation of specific commitments regarding mining activities in the Nachicapau Lake Area on November 10th;
 - Participation in working sessions with the Naskapi Nation of Kawawachikamach and the MELCCFP representatives for the production of Cambrien / Nachicapau Status Report.

Park projects

- In preparation for the 12th meeting of Iluiliq National Park project, which will be held in Salluit on December 5 and 6:
 - A letter and resolutions in response to the Government proposed boundaries for the park project is being drafted by KRG and Makivik on behalf of the Working Group;
 - Specific information tools related to the park project are being produced.

6. PARKS

General

- There were a total of 532 visitors in all four (4) national parks this year;
- Summer and weekend packages commenced at almost full capacity;
- We welcomed four groups of Air Inuit employees on our summer weekend packages, through their Immersion Nunavik program;
- Employees are working on Nunavik Parks 20th anniversary program for 2024;
- Conservation Specialist participated in meeting with the community of Kangiqsualujjuaq for the renewal of their project Imalirijit. Nunavik Parks has a desire to strengthen bonds with the community to see how our conservation activities can answer local concerns about the environment and ensure we can collaboratively complement their research;
- Nunavik Parks management coordinator was invited to Kawawachikamach in September to give a presentation about the national parks in Nunavik. This meeting was organized by SNAP Quebec;
- Customer Service and Marketing Agent is working on new visuals for leaflets, posters and other items;
- Customer Service and Marketing Agent took part in the Bourse des médias (Alliance de l'industrie touristique) with Nunavik Tourism Association, which allowed us to talk about the parks in a personalized way to nearly 20 journalists;
- Customer Service and Marketing Agent participated in the Alliance de l'industrie touristique convention in September. This convention was an opportunity to reflect and find solutions with tourism entrepreneurs and artisans to continue making Quebec a destination of choice;
- Customer Service and Marketing Agent participated to the Aventure Écotourisme Québec congress in Charlevoix on October 7 and 8. This congress is two days of workshops and presentations for adventure tourism and outdoor professionals;
- Visitor experience meeting was held in Kuujjuaq last week of October. Subjects discussed were debrief on 2023, planning 2024, reviewing of the packages and trainings. All parks were represented and several employees from Kuujjuaq actively participated;
- Assistant-Director and Conservation Specialist participated to the "Comité consultatif sur les parcs". Conservation Specialist did a presentation with a focus on the activities undertaken by Nunavik Parks for conservation and education;
- Conservation Specialist did many communications outreach with the different park's team related to conservation, and all together with VEOs reviewed the fishing regulations for non beneficiaries to answer the local teams concern;
- The hiring of a Safety Technician is still underway.

Parc national des Pingualuit

- There were forty-two (42) visitors in the park and one hundred and sixty-four (64) at the visitor center during this period;
- In 2023, there was a total of one hundred and seventy-seven (177) visitors in Pingualuit and two hundred and ninety-three (293) visitors at the pavilion;
- Canadian Royalties went to the park to do environmental sampling on two occasions during this period;
- A contractor installed 31 new windows at Manarsulik & Itirviluarjuk camps in September with one of our warden's help;
- Parks employees participated with Quebec Wildlife Protection Officers in a patrol in September;

- A helicopter was chartered to Pingualuit September 11-13 for the closing of the camps, sling material and proceed with conservation & environmental sampling. Conservation Specialist recovered data logger and removed the biodiversity station in Manarsulik, as well as proceeding with water sampling;
- A Museology consultant was hired for Parc national des Pingualuit to do a status report of the permanent exhibition. Following the analysis, actions will be taken to improve and enhance the visitor experience for the 20th anniversary in 2024;
- Education Technician and Conservation and Education specialist visited Pingualuit pavilion to meet the local team and talk about their needs in the current permanent exhibition, including the scientific content of the permanent exhibition, and plan the maintenance of the audiovisuals and the content;
- The newly hired Conservation and Education Specialist for Pingualuit conducted his first visit in Kangiqsujuaq in order to meet the team and discuss their needs in conservation;
- Visitor experience officer took part in the VEO meeting in Kuujuaq last week of October;
- Administrative technician took the office skills training with Pijunnaqunga, Nunavik internship program, at the end of October.

Parc national Kuururjuaq

- There were fourteen (14) visitors in the park and fifty-seven (57) at the visitor center during this period;
- In 2023, there was a total of one hundred and fifty-five (155) visitors in Kuururjuaq and one hundred and ninety-eight (198) visitors at the pavilion;
- The parks employees took students boating and will continue throughout October;
- Wardens are redoing and replacing old five (5) of six (6) qamutiks;
- Park Director joined local Parnasimautik to talk about park operations to local organizations;
- A helicopter was chartered to Kuururjuaq for the closing, maintenance of camps, sling material and proceed with conservation & environmental sampling;
- Conservation and education specialist conducted field monitoring in the park and proceeded with the recovery of data logger in Upper Koroc;
- A new dome was assembled and will be used at Upper Koroc for 2024 summer season.

Parc national Ulittaniujalik

- In 2023, there were a total of sixty (60) autonomous visitors in the park. The demand for the George river descent by autonomous visitors is growing;
- In September, a weather station was installed at the Qamanialuk sector of the park;
- The old airstrip at the Qamanialuk sector was inspected and the process to restore it began in September to re-enable the use of this airstrip;
- Operation Coordinator took part in the VEO meeting in Kuujuaq last week of October.

Parc national Tursujuq

- There were thirty-seven (37) visitors in the park and sixty-eight (68) visitors at the visitor center during this period;
- In 2023, there were a total of one hundred and forty (140) visitors in Tursujuq in 2023 and eighty-six (86) visitors at the pavilion during the year;
- Visitor experience Officer and Administrative Technicians organized a cultural evening event on September 14;
- Wardens travelled to Wiyâshâkimî in Mid-September to install camp guidelines to help protect and preserve the area around the camps;
- Harmonization committee meeting was held in Kuujuaaraapik/Whapmagoostui on October 17. Some subjects discussed included a presentation of conservation work results for

2023, summary of summer operations, and a presentation of 2024 projects and operations. Members of Parc national Tursujuq Harmonization Committee had a presentation of the preliminary concept for the permanent exhibition at the Sakkuk building in Kuujuaapik to be inaugurated for summer 2024. On October 18, members also had the chance to visit the room that will hold the exhibition;

- Tursujuq acquired 10 pictures taken by Andrew Naluktuk from Umiujaq to be used in the permanent exhibition in Kuujuaapik. People who visit this exhibition will be able to see PNT through the eyes of Andrew;
- In the beginning of October, park wardens installed a 20'X20' platform near the pavilion for the Shelter Design tent;
- Gilbert Inukpuk delivered a replica of each of the six (6) artifacts chosen from artifacts in the Umiujaq archeological collection. Those tools will be used by visitors and school groups to manipulate and to be used in a real context on the land;
- Tursujuq park employees relocated back to the transit for the winter on October 30;
- Visitor experience officer took part in the VEO meeting in Kuujuaq last week of October;
