



ACTIVITY REPORT
RENEWABLE RESOURCES, ENVIRONMENT, LANDS AND PARKS
June-September 2023

Mandates and responsibilities:

- Fishing and Trapping Support Program: overall program administration, technical assistance to Community programs and management of the regional program;
- Uumajuit Wardens Program: wildlife protection on the land in the marine sectors;
- Environmental Program: technical assistance to the Northern Villages, environmental monitoring, research, climate change and environmental projects;
- Land Use Planning: technical assistance to the Northern Villages and regional planning;
- National Parks development and operation.

1. INUIT HUNTING, FISHING AND TRAPPING SUPPORT PROGRAM

- The second payment of the community grants were paid to the NV s in an amount of \$4,101,457 which included the indexation;
- The construction of a landing barge for Kuujjuaraapik was delayed and is expected to be on the last sealift;
- The boat builders went to Kangirsuk, Kangiqsujaq, Kangiqsualujuaq and Inukjuak to do inspections and minor repairs on the HSP community boats;
- The Nunavik Land Mobile Radio project is in the process for Ivujivik, Inukjuak, Umiujaq and Kuujjuaraapik. Shelters have arrived to the communities and are in the process of being installed;
- Tender for the community freezer for Quaqtac went through, they will be receiving their community freezer next year, Northern Village will need to find a site so the hydro pole can be put up before it arrives next year;
- Freezers inspections were done for Puvirnituaq, Salluit and Inukjuak;
- Harpoon heads were given to the communities as gifts, for the communities that haven't received them, Aupaluk, Umiujaq, Salluit, Ivujivik, Kuujjuaraapik, please pick them up at RRD office;
- The community of Kangiqsualujuaq was visited by boat builders to instruct them on the boat operations;
- Community visit was done in Aupaluk.

2. UUMAJUIT WARDENS PROGRAM

- In 2023 so far 694 days of patrol days with 8 days search and rescue;
- Limited access to our intranet, dayforce, etc. resulted in a few weeks of Weekly reports not submitted by our team;
- Regular Weekly telephone meetings held with Quebec Wildlife Protection Officers (MFFP) DFO representatives and all wardens are active and ongoing;
- Statistics reporting on Beluga sightings and harvests along with monitoring of hunting on a daily basis, ongoing with each warden;
- As part of the Nunavik Indigenous Guardians Initiative, the Wardens continue to document and report observations on environmental and climate changes on the land;
- Participated in the monthly meetings of the KRG/DFO Liaison committee;

- Recruitment for a warden in Aupaluk and Kuujjuaq is on-going., .
- DFO officers patrolled with our wardens in some communities and is on going;
- Planning of updating communications equipment still in progress, Wardens used the inReach devices as communications ;
- On-going work with different departments of MFFP and Makivvik for research studies with our Wardens assisting in few communities and visits, retrieval of equipment in the process now in the communities;
- Planning and preparing for a Refresher training in Kuujjuaq last week of October with DFO and MFFP.

3. ENVIRONMENT

Residual Material Management

- Waste Management working group sessions were held in Nunavik, visits to Kuujjuaq, Kangirsuk and Inukjuak were done;
- Metal project: The metal project started at Aupaluk on July 16th. About 400 tons of metal was treated including the decontamination of end of life vehicles. In Kangirsuk, all the vehicles (125) and heavy machinery (28) were sent to the south in July (about 320 tons)
- Monitoring of the recycling products under REP (extended producers' responsibilities) in Nunavik. The 14 NVs has received equipment (10-foot container/metal bin) for recycling electronics and used paint;
- Construction of Kuujjuaq ecocenter site began in June with machinery of the NV Kuujjuaq and KRG supervision. The equipment of the second-hand store arrived;
- Drop-off points (Kangiqsualujjuaq and Kangiqsujuaq): the equipment arrived with the 1st sealift. The site location was chosen in Kangiqsualujjuaq and it's remains to be determined in Kangiqsujuaq;
- End-life-vehicle site in Quaqtac: The environment authorization was delivered, and the site construction will start in September;
- Composting project In Inukjuak: Holding of an information session to present the stages of the project and to start the awareness campaign. A call for tender has been launched to extend the site of the composter;
- Several calls for tenders have been launched for waste management projects:
 - purchase of an excavator and open top container for the metal project and a loader for the Kuujjuaq Ecocenter project.
- Development of communication tools for awareness campaigns of the various projects in waste management;
- New agreement was signed with Recyc-Québec for the recycling of oversized tires.

Granular Material Management

- Gravel pit restoration plan in Puvirnituc. The NV council selected four (4) sites to be restored this summer;
- Gravel pit inventory in Inukjuak. The NV selected one potential pit to be characterized in the fall;
- Non-exclusive lease with the Ministry of Natural Resources (MRNF) renewed for: Kuujjuarapik – Umiujaq – Inukjuak – Akulivik – Kangiqsualujjuaq.

Spill Management

- During the reporting period, fifty-four (54) spills were reported to the KRG: fifteen (15) from mining companies and thirty-nine (39) reported or observed from regional organizations;
- Tasiujaq: Discussions with Hydro-Québec on future planning for the management of contaminated soil at the site of the former thermal generating station. Hydro-Québec is considering the options of on-site treatment of contaminated soils. The estimated volume of soil requiring treatment is around 15,000 cubic metres;
- At the beginning of July, survey of former hydrometric stations in collaboration with MELCCFP, to identify sites likely to be contaminated with mercury;
- Environmental prevention inspections were undertaken in Aupaluk, Kangiqsualujjuaq, Kangiqsujuaq, Kuujjuaq, Kuujjuraapik, Puvirnituq, Salluit, Tasiujaq and Umiujaq on heating oil tanks and drums to identify leaks or possible non-compliance; the owner of the buildings have been contacted;
- Training session for users of Traces Québec, a platform specifically designed to manage traceability data for excavated contaminated soils, ensuring optimal tracking. All contaminated soil excavated and moved from their original location must be registered in the Traces Québec system.
- Assist the NV of Kuujjuaq for the traceability of the decontaminated soil from Englobe-Nunatech site to the construction site of the new EcoCenter.

Environmental Research

The Inuit Research Advisor (IRA):

- Travelled to Quaqtq May 31st to June 7 with researcher Mathew Little for the project called “Piujuut (the good stuff): Country food access and preferences in Nunavik”. They conducted interviews for the local population of Quaqtq to gather information by questionnaire style research;
- Participated in a Sharing Workshop on mapping tools to Improve Preparedness for Marine Incident Management in and around Kuujjuaq River on July 11-13th;
- August 2 had a meeting with staff from NRBHSS to prepare content for the training for the Nunavik field workers of the upcoming National Health Survey in early October to present “Background and history of Research and Surveys in Nunavik” and “Overview of Qanuipitaa 2017 key results”;
- Participated in Attaniuvik Steering committee meetings on June 14.

Regional Environment

Caniapiscau Watershed Abandoned Outfitting Camp Clean-up:

- Contacts have been made with lease owners of the permanent camps. Most of them are interested in collaborating with KRG for the clean-up of their installations;
- The project manager is working on the 2023 field work logistics, which will include the clean-up of two (2) permanent outfitting camps;
- The new action plan 2023-2026 was submitted to ECCC for approval;
- The 2022–2023 activity report and payment request have been approved by ECCC.

Nunavik Abandoned Mineral Exploration Sites Restoration:

- The Steering Committee approved the 2022–2023 activity report in May 2023;
- A communication committee was formed to develop a communication strategy to share the results of the overall 20 years of NAMESR project; this includes the production of a short documentary on the project.

Mid-Canada Line:

- A meeting with government representatives was held to discuss the funding of site inspections and the work plan development.
- The inspection days for both sites that have been attributed to the KRG are booked for September.

4. LAND USE PLANNING

Regional Planning

- A questionnaire on the opportunities presented by the Quebec government's Nature Plan 2030 project was completed to provide the vision and needs for the region's biodiversity;
- Letters of Conformity: during this period, nine (09) projects of Land use occupations were approved and one (1) project was denied.

Municipal Planning, Expansion Plans and Technical Assistance Program

- Technical assistance was provided to: Quaqtaq, Salluit, Inukjuak, Kangiqsujuaq and Kuujuaq for consistent integration of construction projects into NV land use plans;
- The first meeting of the Sustainable Development of Northern Villages committee took place on June 15 with KI, NRBHSS, KMHB, Makivvik, and Hydro-Québec;
- Planning and coordinating the community's expansion areas for the 2024 social housing allocation for Tasiujaq, Ivujivik, Salluit, Ivujivik, Kangiqsualujuaq, Akulivik and Aupaluk in collaboration with MPW and Makivvik construction;
- In June, the land use planning team presented the comprehensive community plan to the council of Quaqtaq and Inukjuak for their comments;
- Planning and coordinating the community's expansion areas for 2023-2024 with other organizations, KI, NRBHSS and Hydro-Québec.
- Land use section continues its participation in Takuvuq project with partners for the creation of an online platform that will give access to all historic orthophotos of the communities and the region;
- A visit to Salluit took place in May with the professionals to begin testing and planning for Salluit four (4) and for meeting with NV Council;
- A preliminary version of the Ivujivik and Kangiqsujuaq Master Plans have been produced, the next step is to present the draft to the NVs for comment;
- The process to produce the comprehensive community Plan of Kuujuarapik, Kangirsuk and Puvirnituk was initiated with an external land use firm.

5. PROTECTED AREAS

20% Protected Areas

- The report on phase one(1) of the consultations on protected areas in Nunavik is being drafted by the consultant;
- Kick-off meeting to initiate the planning of phase two (2) for consultations on protected areas in Nunavik was held on July 28 with the Advisory Committee members: KRG, Makivvik, NNK, CNG and MELCCFP;
- Specific Agreement to preserve the Cambrien Lake / Nachicapau Lake / Fort Mackenzie (Waskaikinis) Areas:
 - Participated in a meeting of the Commitment Monitoring Committee on May 31:

- members agreed to accelerate the implementation of commitments;
 - Participated in a meeting of the Subcommittee on the search for alternatives to hydroelectric power development in the area covered by the Agreement on June 1st;
 - Participation in working sessions with the Naskapi Nation of Kawawachikamach and the MELCCFP representatives for the production of Cambrien / Nachicapau Status Report;
- Installation of a biodiversity cell in the Kovik River Proposed Aquatic Reserve on July 14: instruments and equipment were installed to acquire knowledge on the biodiversity;
- Water samples were collected in the Rivière-George territorial reserve for protected area purposes and Strange Lake sector, in collaboration with the University of Montréal and Imalirijit, with the aim of building a baseline for water quality.

Park projects

- 11th meeting of the Ilulit National Park Project Working Group was held in Ivujivik on July 26th:
 - Protection around the thick-billed murre colony was discussed;
 - Air Inuit report on potential landing strips was presented;
 - The new mining claims acquired in the study area were presented;
 - Government's position on the proposed limits for the park was discussed;
- A panoramic helicopter flight of the Ilulit National Park project study area was offered to members of the communities of Salluit and Ivujivik on August 1 to learn more about the project.

6. PARKS

General

- 2023 summer tourist operations occurred from mid-July to beginning of September;
- Wildlife Protection Sergeant in Kuujuaq trained Wardens to become Wildlife Protection Assistants. Two (2) Wardens and the Operation Coordinator from Pingualuit, two (2) Wardens from Kuurujuaq and the Assistant Director undertook the training;
- Refresher course was delivered by a Quebec Wildlife Protection Officer on July 7 to Wardens to renew their status as Wildlife Protection Assistant;
- A course is currently being undertaken on-line by several parks employees, and many community helpers to be trained for on the Workplace Hazardous Material Information System (WHMIS);
- To mark the arrival of qullit in each park in the Nunavik Parks network, local teams received \$1,000 to organize training over the summer on how to use qullik and how to gather maniit and sputiit. The teams in Kangiqsualujuaq, Kangiqsujuaq and Umiujaq were asked to hire local knowledge holders to pass on their knowledge to Nunavik Parks employees and to the communities. This training will be offered on an annual basis;
- Wardens and conservation and educational specialists participated with Quebec Wildlife Protection Officers in patrols in each of the four (4) parks;
- Olivier Paradis, former Visitor Experience Officer in Kangiqsualujuaq, was hired as a temporary Visitor Experience Technician;
- Aubrey Claude-Desroches was hired as a temporary Project Manager Infrastructure until mid-September;
- Corentin Chaillon was hired as a Specialist in Conservation and Education;
- Camille Baril-Laflamme was hired as a Visitor Experience Technician;
- Keara Pfeiff was hired as a Project Manager Infrastructure;

- Marie-Ève Charlebois was hired as a Customer Service and Marketing Agent;
- The hiring of a Safety Technician is underway.

Parc national des Pingualuit

- There were ninety-five (95) visitors in the park and one hundred and fifty-three (153) at the visitor center during this period;
- Visitors on the long packages stay in Kangirsujuaq for 3 days guided by Kangirsujuaq Adventures before going to Pingualuit for six (6) days;
- A helicopter was chartered to Pingualuit for the opening, maintenance of camps and the airstrip, sling material and proceed with conservation & environmental sampling;
- Office employees participated to the literature summer camp by doing various cultural presentations;
- First aid training in remote areas was offered by Sirius to park's employees and community helpers week of June 5. All parks have received the training in the spring;
- Two groups from Montreal's Insectarium came to train employees on collecting and preserving butterflies and insects for surveying purposes. They installed the autonomous monitoring of insects machine and showed park's employees how to monitor it;
- Two employees from Avataq/Quebec archeological reserve came to Kangirsujuaq to assess the conditions of Masiu Ningiuruvik's qajaq, other artifacts and carvings in the interpretation center. Pingualuit shared copies of multiple videos and audio recordings with them of Kangirsujuaq elders teaching the staff their traditional knowledge, to keep them in Avataq archives;
- There was a show and tell event at the community's gymnasium, organized with Nunavik Parks education technician and two (2) employees from Avataq. Locals brought their collection of artifacts and traditional clothing to tell a story about them. About seventy (70) people came to the event;
- Harmonization committee meeting was on June 5, main topics were winter visitors' statistics, summer bookings, conservation & construction/maintenance objectives, partnership with Kangirsujuaq Adventures and MELCCFP's update on the park expansion and new zoning proposition;
- In July, the conservation and education specialist conducted the annual water monitoring and collected eDNA sampling for Makivvik research to assess biodiversity;
- Conservation and education specialist went into the park for the opening of the camp and set a new biodiversity monitoring which includes mammals, insects, birds, zooplankton and eDNA sampling in Manarsulik;
- Willie Alaku jr was hired as a full time Warden;
- Peter Kiatainaq and Joanasi Tertiluk were hired as Seasonal Wardens;
- Steven Irniq and Matthew Jaaka were hired as summer students to help Wardens.

Parc national Kuururjuaq

- There were seventy-five (75) visitors in the park and thirty-five (35) at the visitor center during this period;
- There were twenty-two (22) weekend visitors in the park during this period;
- In partnership with Parks Canada, a familiarization tour was organized for a hiking trip from upper Koroc to Seglek;
- Harmonization committee meeting was held in Kangiqsualujjuaq on June 7. Some subjects discussed included a presentation of conservation work requests for 2023, summary of winter operations, and presentation of the summer projects and construction work;

- A helicopter was chartered to Kuururjuaq for the opening, maintenance of camps and the airstrip, sling material and proceed with conservation & environmental sampling;
- A local group with the sober challenge went boating for a day;
- A group of nine (9) from Laval University went boating for the day;
- A parks canoe was used to do a rescue mission;
- Construction of an emergency shelter for mount Kauvvik summit expedition was slung to the football field;
- Construction of a boat shelter by the park garage in Kangiqsualujjuaq was done in August;
- Regional councillors of the Kativik Regional Government and support crew visited the exhibition and the pavilion in June after the Regional Council;
- Conservation and education specialist went into the park with a team from CEN to evaluate the possibility of future research in relation to forest fires;
- eDNA sample was taken in the Koroc river, water and soil sampling was also taken;
- Conservation and education specialist also conducted field monitoring in the park at the beginning of August to monitor the shrub evolution related to climate change, data was also collected from loggers that check for water temperature, water level and snow level;
- Edward Snowball was hired as a Park Warden;
- Saladie Snowball, Visitor Experience Technician, returned after a year off work;
- Noah Jason Annanack was hired as a Seasonal Warden.

Parc national Ulittaniujalik

- There were twenty-two (22) autonomous visitors in the park during this period. The George river descent is becoming more and more popular for autonomous visitors;
- Four (4) Kangiqsualujjuaq elders and the park director gathered at Pyramid Camp June 7-9. Kawawachikamach elders had to cancel due to weather;
- Camping platforms were slung and installed near the portage area along the George River;
- Harmonization committee meeting was held in Kangiqsualujjuaq on June 7. Some subjects discussed include collaboration with École d'architecture, construction of camps in Qamanialuk area, installation of 2 camping platforms along the George river and the Kuujjuaq park pavilion;
- Conservation and Education Specialist did water sampling inside the park;
- Conservation and Education Specialist took part in the Imalirijit working group to identify interest and questions related to the environment around the community that will become feasible projects. Topics of interested included: water quality of the George River, increase of presence of white wish, the effect of black bears on caribou, snow quality for transportation. Will collaborate with CEN and the community to develop projects;
- Water samples in the George River were collected for the annual monitoring, results will be shared with Imalirijit.

Parc national Tursujuq

- There were forty-eight (48) visitors in the park and forty-three (43) visitors at the visitor center during this period;
- Tursujuq's Conservation and Education Specialist took eDNA sampling for fresh water seal around the park with one Park Warden end of May;
- On June 27, Tursujuq park organized a cultural day event for the community;
- In the beginning of July, the first package was cancelled due to the Quebec forest fire;
- On September 6, members of the parc national Tursujuq Harmonization Committee were given a sneak preview of the upcoming exhibition at the Sakkuk building in Kujjuaraapik to be inaugurated for summer 2024. The concept was presented during the meeting;

- A helicopter was chartered to Umiujaq for the opening, maintenance of camps and the airstrip, sling material and proceed with conservation & environmental sampling;
- Construction of a boat shelter by the park pavilion in Umiujaq and another small one in Wiyâshâkimî was done in June;
- Tursujuq park staff relocated back to the pavilion for the summer;
- In August, the Conservation and Education Specialist joined the patrol flight with the Quebec wildlife officers in Tursujuq park area with the Park Director Bobby Tooktoo and Warden Joshua Sala. They surveyed for beaver dams and found fourteen (14) dams in the territory surveyed in the park (228 km of waterways). This new information will be shared with Anguvigaq and Makivvik;
- During that patrol flight as per the harmonization committee wishes, they surveyed the expired mine claims that are now annexed to Tursujuq park, no sign of waste or old camps were found;
- In June, Anna-Kim Page Cornforth was hired as a Visitor Experience Officer based in Umiujaq;
- Samson Crow worked as a Seasonal Warden between mid-June to mid-July;
- Three (3) summer students were hired : two (2) Assistant Wardens and one (1) Assistant Administration Technician;
- Vanessa Aragutak resigned as Visitor Experience Officer in Kuujjuaraapik.
