



## **RENEWABLE RESOURCES, ENVIRONMENT, LANDS AND PARKS**

### **ACTIVITY REPORT JUNE – SEPTEMBER 2024**

Departmental mandates and responsibilities:

- Fishing and Trapping Support: program administration, technical assistance to community programs and management of the regional program.
  - Uumajuit Wardens: wildlife protection on the land in the marine sectors.
  - Environmental: technical assistance to the northern villages, environmental monitoring, research, climate change and environmental projects.
  - Land Use Planning: technical assistance to the northern villages and regional planning.
  - National parks development and operation.

#### **1. INUIT HUNTING, FISHING AND TRAPPING SUPPORT PROGRAM**

- Second grant paid out in July to the Northern Villages for \$4,260,326 (indexed)
- Akulivik's new fishing vessel is now ready; picked up by the crew in August
- Quaqtak's new community freezer has arrived in the community
- Solar cabin kits have been shipped to most communities; balance of kits will be delivered on the last ship
- Procurement of fishing vessel for Salluit is under call for tenders until mid-September
- Captain's training and coordinator's training went for tender at end of August
- Regional Agent position is still open

#### **2. UUMAJUIT WARDENS PROGRAM**

- To date in 2024, 992 days of patrol and 21 days of search and rescue assistance have been provided to municipalities
- Regular weekly telephone meetings ongoing with Quebec Wildlife Protection Officers (MFFP) and DFO representatives, and all wardens are in place and active
- Wardens compiling statistical reports on beluga sightings and harvests along with monitoring hunting daily harvests
- As part of the Nunavik Indigenous Guardians Initiative, wardens continue to document and report observations on environmental and climate changes
- Participated in monthly meetings of KRG/DFO Liaison Committee
- Recruitment for warden in Aupaluk is ongoing
- DFO conducting patrols this summer with Arctic region officers

- We are resolving technical issues to ensure we receive weekly reports from all wardens
- Tender opening soon for the four snowmachines for the last ship
- Coordinator provided Auxiliary Coast Guard courses in several communities
- Joint patrols for bird survey by helicopter with wardens
- Joint patrols with MELCCFP by boat and helicopter in several communities
- Receiving feedback from communities on non-beneficiaries fishing without permits. Our team has been going daily along shorelines and areas where people are fishing. Potential infractions and information shared with the MELCCFP officer in Kuujjuaq.
- Reports of sighting of private float planes and helicopters around Nunavik that may involve fishing and/or hunting without permits; photos sent to MELCCFP to investigate.

### **3. ENVIRONMENT**

#### **Residual Material Management**

- Drop-off points: Engineering plans elaborated, and site construction completed in Tasiujaq and Aupaluk. For Ivujivik and Akulivik, construction will be completed by end of September. The sorting equipment and offices has arrived in these four communities.
- We assisted several Northern Villages that have begun to ship materials under the extended producer's responsibility program.
- Metal recycling project started in Quaqaq with sorting and pressing metal, and decontaminating end-of-life vehicles and heavy machinery.
- All 14 Northern Villages now have a reception office at landfills where construction companies and organizations sign in every time they bring materials. This will help control access and compile data for invoicing users.
- Composting project in Kuujjuaq and Kangiqsualujjuaq: construction of sites is finished, all equipment purchased, and both projects will be completed by end of November.

#### **Granular Material Management**

- Gravel site survey:
  - A gravel pit site with great potential was identified following the 2023 KRG gravel inventory in Inukjuak. This site will be located outside of municipal boundaries, with the NV and the LHC of Inukjuak collaborating on this project. Avataq confirmed that the area is safe for operation. More studies are required prior to extraction because road construction is required to access the site.
  - Kangiqsualujjuaq requested assistance with gravel and sand resources. A preliminary analysis was conducted by external consultants, identifying potential areas for surveying. A meeting was held in August with the NV and LHC to identify and prioritize areas for on-site surveys.
- Administrative management:
  - MRNF non-exclusive leases of two gravel pits were reopened, involving one site in Inukjuak and one site in Umiujaq.
  - All non-exclusive leaseholders must report annual extraction volumes to Ministry of Natural Resources. The KRG assisted five NV with administrative processes for the annual extraction declaration.

## **Spill Management**

- During the reporting period, 43 spills were reported to the KRG: 11 from mining companies and 32 reported or observed from regional organizations.
- Environmental prevention inspections were undertaken in Kangiqsujuaq, Inukjuak, Kangiqsualujuaq, Ivujivik, Kangirsuk and Kuujuaq on heating oil tanks and drums to identify leaks or possible non-compliance; owners of buildings have been contacted.
- Technical assistance was provided to Kangiqsujuaq on a boat spill at the marina. Nearly 40 truckloads of contaminated soil were excavated.
- From July 15-18, MELCCFP visited Kangiqsujuaq, Quaqaq and Kangirsuk. Infrastructure and contaminated sites were inspected.
- We completed follow-up on a May 2020 oil spill at the Ivujivik water pumping station. Water and soil samples were taken in collaboration with an external environmental consultant. Water analysis results did not reveal contamination of the drinking water. However, the soil sample revealed contamination under the building. KRG Environment will continue to follow-up with FCNQ and the NV.

## **Climate change**

- The program “Supporting Inuit leadership in the climate transition” will be launched in September. Communities, organizations or individuals who want to apply to obtain funds for their climate change adaptation, monitoring or mitigation projects will be able to submit proposals to the KRG using the guide and forms available on the KRG website. More information will be shared in the coming weeks.

## **Regional Environment**

### **Caniapiscou Watershed Abandoned Outfitting Camp Clean-up:**

- Three days of field work with a team from Umiujaq to clean two abandoned outfitting camps (Chabanel Lake and Caniapiscou River). Over 15,000 lb of debris were removed, including about 10 full drums that were threatening water bodies. All the waste will be sent to southern facilities for recycling or disposal.

### **Mid-Canada Line:**

- Funding agreement to undertake first phase of work (removing materials and complementary characterization) is under review.

### **Water source protection:**

- We participated in consultations on the « Stratégie québécoise de l'eau (SQE) » and its action plan specific to Indigenous nations. Comments were sent to MELCCFP on July 30.
- Our environment specialist travelled to Inukjuak and Akulivik from May 10–17 to identify potential risks within the watershed and to supplement information for community water source vulnerability studies.

### **Public Land General:**

- A letter was sent to MFFP on modifications to the « « Règlement Vente, location et octroi de droits immobiliers sur les terres du domaine de l'État » This provincial regulation provides a framework for the transfer of leases in the Kativik region.

## **4. LAND USE PLANNING**

### **Regional Planning**

- During the period, 11 certificates of conformity for projects of land use occupation were approved: four involving Impact-Causing Exploration Work that required a new authorization from the MRNF, and one notice of conformity was sent.
- We participated to the Nunavik Mining Workshop on June 4-6.
- Between August 19-23, a total of 50 sites were inspected.
- Virtual consultation meeting with JBACE was held on September 10 to receive feedback on the By-Law Respecting Land Use, Social and Environmental Protection.

### **Municipal Planning, Expansion Plans and Technical Assistance Program**

- Feedback from meeting with NVs continues to be incorporated into master plans for Kuujjuarapik, Puvirnituq, Ivujjivik, Kangiqsujuaq, Inukjuak and Quaḡtaḡ.
- Data collected during consultations in Tasiujaḡ and Kangirsuk in April is being processed.
- Geotechnical studies in Tasiujaḡ completed by engineering firm to evaluate construction potential in new development zones identified by community members in their Master Plan. Preliminary results will be reported to the NV in the coming months.
- Avataḡ has been hired to provide assistance with archaeological studies in future community expansion zones.
- A new geomatic specialist was welcomed to the land use team.
- The GIS database for the communities has been updated, with new roads, buildings and cadastral data for all communities, except for Umiujaḡ and Kuujjuarapik. Field validations are underway for those two communities.
- Civic number basemaps were produced and sent to all Northern Villages. Field validations are underway, and maps will be sent in coming weeks. Updated maps are available on the KRG website.
- Specific drainage and community evolution maps have been produced and updated for Quaḡtaḡ Master Plan update.

## **PROTECTED AREAS**

### **Plan Nature**

- Took part in 4<sup>th</sup> phase of Indigenous consultation session on Québec Nature Plan, which includes the objective of protecting 30% of Québec by 2030.
- The KRG responded to MELCCFP consultations on development of the Nature Plan. We reiterated that the Nature Plan should be developed solely and directly with region's stakeholders, and that the action plan should be specific and appropriate to Nunavik, in which only relevant targets meeting regional development needs are selected. A second letter reiterating this position was sent to MELCCFP, when the KRG was asked to comment on the Plan for Indigenous Leadership in Biodiversity Conservation.

## 20% Protected Areas

- Finalized summary report and community fact sheets for Phase One of Nunavik protected areas consultations. Documents will be shared with communities and posted to Nunavik Protected Areas web site.
- Redesigned and updated Nunavik protected areas website (nunavikprotectedareas.com).
- Participated in meetings of subcommittee on implementation of commitments on mining activities in Nachicapau Lake Area. Discussions continued on conditions to be issued within the future Reserve to the State.
- Participated in working sessions with Naskapi Nation of Kawawachikamach and MELCCFP representatives to produce Cambrien/Nachicapau Status Report.
- Collaborated with Parks for boreal birds and bats inventory in Rivière-George and Rivière-George-Nord Territorial Reserves for Protected Area Purposes and in Ulittaniujalik National Park. Recorders were installed in May and recovered in August. This project is being undertaken with Canadian Wildlife Service.
- Recorders for inventory of boreal birds and bats in Nachicapau Lake Sector and in Rivière-Arnaud (Payne River) Territorial Reserve for Protected Area Purposes were installed in May and recovered in August. These projects also are being undertaken with Canadian Wildlife Service.
- Equipment for Québec biodiversity monitoring project in Rivière-Arnaud (Payne River) Territorial Reserve for Protected Area Purposes was installed in May. A follow-up visit was carried out in July and equipment recovered. This project was initiated by the MELCCFP to monitor the effects of climate change on ecosystems.
- Environmental DNA samples have been taken from waters in Cambrien and Nachicapau lakes sector. An analysis of these samples by INRS will provide a list of the area's wildlife species.

## Park projects

Iluliliq National Park:

- The Iluliliq National Park Project Working Group met September 5-6 in Kuujuaq. Next next steps for the park project were discussed.

## 5. NUNAVIK PARKS

- Nunavik Parks is planning and organization 20th anniversary activities.
- During the period, we hired a Safety Technician and Infrastructure Project Manager.
- New visitor information material on park itineraries has been designed and distributed.
- We renewed our Immersion Nunavik partnership with Air Inuit to offer their employees unique opportunities to visit our parks.

- Collaboration with Parks Canada is being explored to offer a two parks – one destination project.
- A Nunavik Parks coordinator met with new Montreal teachers who are coming to Nunavik to talk about the parks and what we offer to school groups.
- A global evaluation of our satellite communication devices was done and updated in Pingualuit, Tursujuq and Kuururjuaq parks.

### **Conservation and education**

- Nunavik Parks conservation and education specialists participated in a project with Nunavik Sentinels at Tursujuq park. They spent a week on the land to introduce youth from Umiujaq to insect science.
- First edition of Conservation Stories was presented, which provides a window on conservation and education activities undertaken by Nunavik Parks.
- Incoming fieldwork for parc national des Pingualuit was presented at a harmonization committee meeting.
- During the opening of the season in July, water samples were taken in Manarsulik lake, Puvirnituq river and Vachon river to monitor the water quality and possible impact of mining activities in the park.
- A contract was signed with Qajaqt, an organization preserving the Inuit art of building a qajaq. A workshop will occur in September in Kangirsujuaq.
- Water loggers were set in Qurlutuarjuq camp in parc national Kuururjuaq.
- Greening of tundra is a major concern with global warming. In response and in collaboration with Park Canada and Torngats National Park, we monitored growth of dwarf birch along the slopes of the Koroc Valley.

### **Parc national des Pingualuit**

- Pingualuit opened summer operations on July 15.
- Staff worked on resurfacing the airstrip, installed docks, and did building maintenance.
- Summer students were hired as warden assistants.
- Agreement signed with Pijunnaqunga internship program for hiring intern warden's assistant.
- La Presse magazine released an article on cultural and educational experiences in Kangirsujuaq and Pingualuit.
- Twelve representatives from Illuiliq National Park project working group went to Pingualuit to view infrastructure and operations.
- Two education and cultural projects managers from Montreal's Insectarium visited to collect stories on Nunavik insects. The plan is to have an exhibition in the interpretation centre.
- For the 20th anniversary, we signed a contract with archeologist Mariane-Marilou Leclerc who will organize a conference and workshop on Chert Knapping in Kangiqsualujjuaq.

### **Parc national Kuururjuaq**

- There were three Iberville packages including one long package, and two weekend packages including one Air Inuit custom weekend package.
- A Kuururjuaq harmonization committee meeting was held in Kangiqsualujjuaq.

- We hired two seasonal wardens, two local helpers and one summer student.
- Wildlife assistant training for wardens and operations coordinator took place.
- All-staff boat safety training took place.
- Construction maintenance occurred at Iberville basecamp and at Upper Koroc.
- Videoconference audio was installed at the office.
- Terre Innu First nation film crew went to Upper Koroc to film their series.
- A Nunavik Parks and Parks Canada exploratory trek was cut short due to safety reasons. This trek started on the Quebec side and ended on the Labrador side.
- Two mountain guides from different companies were hired to do a trial at Iberville area and summit.
- Maintenance was completed on three weather stations and training of a staff member on how to maintain and fix them.
- Water monitoring was completed.
- One position for park warden is open.

### **Parc national Ulittaniujalik**

- An Ulittaniujalik harmonization committee meeting was held in Kangiqsualujjuaq.
- A helicopter was booked to check potential tent platforms and welcome signs.
- Bird monitoring recorders were installed to collect more data on wildlife and to fill gaps in knowledge on bird diversity.
- Water monitoring was completed.
- Nunavik Parks and Imalirijit are collaborating on a new project, Avatittini. A conservation specialist is being assisted by two youth from Kangiqsualujjuaq with water sampling in both parks and around the community.

### **Parc national Tursujuq**

- Tursujuq staff took part in kayak training, and park wardens did boat safety training.
- Two new outboard motors were received for the Silver Dolphin boat this summer.
- Nunavik Sentinels installed an AMI system near the park pavilion to study insects.
- Park wardens installed signalization panels at Isuani near the park cabin.
- Nunavik Sentinels organized a summer camp in partnership with Nunavik Parks at Sukkuq River.
- Three Twin Otter charter flights to Wiyashakimi to transport in tourists and clean-up crews.
- We offered a kayak package in the Tasiujaq area.
- Two cultural nights were organized involving throat singing and qulliq lighting.
- We hired four people from Whapmagoostui and four people from Umiujaq for summer operations. We also hired three summer students.
