



**ACTIVITY REPORT**  
**RENEWABLE RESOURCES, ENVIRONMENT, LANDS AND PARKS**  
**NOVEMBER 2023 - FEBRUARY 2024**

Mandates and responsibilities:

- Fishing and Trapping Support Program: program administration, technical assistance to community programs and management of the regional program;
  - Uumajuit Wardens Program: wildlife protection on the land in the marine sectors;
  - Environmental Program: technical assistance to the northern villages, environmental monitoring, research, climate change and environmental projects;
  - Land Use Planning: technical assistance to the northern villages and regional planning;
  - national parks development and operation.

## **1. INUIT HUNTING, FISHING AND TRAPPING SUPPORT PROGRAM**

- Community agreements were sent. Community HSP grant payments were done in January totaling \$3,915,751 and with 50% payment of \$825,000 from Makivvik for fur, clothing and inuliqtait;
- The new fishing vessel for Akulivik has been tendered and is in the process of being built to receive it this summer;
- Meeting with Tarquti Energy Corp. was held in December concerning the solar cabin kits. This project is underway, solar powered generators should be delivered for sale in each community. The cost for the buyer will be \$1,500 per person, \$1,000 of which will be payment to the Tarquti Energy Corp and \$500 to the HSP. These will be for the hunters that have camps outside the community. The municipality will have to confirm and pay for them in order to receive them this summer.
- There were lost equipment processed for Kuujuaq, Akulivik, Inukjuak and Salluit.
- There is a Regional Agent job position open.

## **2. UUMAJUIT WARDENS PROGRAM**

- In 2023, a total of 1,160 days of patrol days with 11 days search and rescue assistance to municipalities;
- Since the beginning of 2024, there are already 55 patrol days;
- Regular weekly telephone meetings held with Quebec Wildlife Protection Officers, and Department of Fishing and Ocean (DFO) representatives; all wardens are active and ongoing;
- Statistics reporting on Beluga sightings and harvests along with monitoring of hunting daily harvests are ongoing with each warden;
- As part of the Nunavik Indigenous Guardians Initiative, the wardens continue to document and report observations on environmental and climate changes on the land;
- Participated in the monthly meetings of the KRG/DFO Liaison Committee;
- Recruitment for a warden in Aupaluk is still ongoing;
- DFO officers patrolled with Uumajuit wardens in some communities at the end of 2023;
- Some technical issues faced by some wardens for the submission of their weekly reports is being worked on by the KRG IT department;
- Ongoing work continues with departments of MELCCFP and Makivvik for research

studies; with our wardens assisting in several communities and with visits and retrieval of equipment in place now in the communities.

- Preparing 2024 tender for four snowmachines and four ATVs for the communities, and finalizing list of priority with machine conditions in each community. Machines would be sent by sealift in Summer 2024.

### **3. ENVIRONMENT**

#### **Residual Material Management**

- The recent Northern Action Plan of Société du Plan Nord has secured new funding to continue implementing new waste management measures across all NV (metal recycling projects, drop-off points, eco-centres and composting project);
- Composting project in Inukjuak: the operation started late November. At the moment, only the materials that come from groceries and institutions are collected. The employees have received training and KRG is providing support in the operation of the composter;
- New drop-offs point projects were proposed for Aupaluk, Akulivik, Ivujivik and Tasiujaq. Two composting projects were proposed to Kuujuaq and Kangiqsualujuaq. The authorization request for these projects were sent to the Ministry of Environment;
- RRD employees are working with Kangiqsualujuaq and Kangiqsujuaq to finish the installation and start the operation in new drop-off points. The communication tools were received (signs, flyers, posters); the drop-off point in Kangiqsualujuaq now has a dedicated technician who helps the community sort residual materials. He received training at the end of January;
- Eco-centre of Kuujuaq: the site construction is finalized, it still needs to be hooked up onto the main power grid and equipment still needs to be installed. The project will be finalized during summer 2024 but it is now in operation;
- Several calls for tenders have been launched for many projects to prepare for the 2024 season (composters equipment, modified containers, loader).

#### **Granular Material Management**

- Gravel site restoration:
  - The Ministry of Natural Resources and Forests (MRNF) received the final report for the abandoned sand and gravel pits restoration program, and the last subsidy payment was sent to Quaqtak. A total of \$100,304 . was granted to Quaqtak to restore nine abandoned sand pits for a total superficies of 13.6 ha;
  - Summary and recommendations of the restoration project were sent to Puvirnituk. The final report is still in progress with an external consultant;
  - Summary and recommendations of the gravel inventory project was sent to Inukjuak. The final report is still in progress with an external consultant.

#### **Spill Management**

- During the reporting period, 15 spills were reported to the KRG: 11 from mining companies and four reported or observed from regional organizations;
- The KRG work in close collaboration with the MELCCFP for the follow-up on spills in Nunavik. For this reason there were several requests for access to information that have been submitted.

## **Environmental Research and Monitoring**

- Participated in monthly meetings with Attaniuvik Steering Committee;
- Participate in the Atanniuvik Research Management System Workshop in Kuujjuaq on January 15-17.

## **Regional Environment**

### Caniapiscau Watershed Abandoned Outfitting Camp Clean-up:

- The clean-up offer was sent to camp owners by email. Priority will be given to owners who plan to re-sign their lease with MRNF;
- Initial agreement with ECCC has officially been prolonged to 2026.

### Nunavik Abandoned Mineral Exploration Sites Restoration:

- Follow-ups have been done with the MRNF and Canadian Royalties concerning the remediation of the Chrysler Camp located about 80 km southwest of Kuujjuaq.

### Mid-Canada Line:

- KRG is establishing a partnership with Institute National for Scientific Research (INRS) to develop a soil decontamination protocol for the Mid-Canada Line sites;
- Contacts have been made with potential service providers on the clean-up contract coming up next summer.

### Water source protection

- KRG will produce the water source vulnerability studies for the villages of Inukjuak, Kuujjuarapik, Kangirsuk, Kangiqsujaq and Akulivik to identify the potential risks within the water shed of these communities.

## **4. LAND USE PLANNING**

### **Regional Planning**

- Finalization of the by-law respecting land use and social and environmental protection;
- Production of a preliminary version of the online regional master plan tool;
- Letters of Conformity: during this period, two projects of land use occupations were approved;
- In the context of the Québec land use plan for the Kativik region (*Plan d'affectation de la région Kativik*), comments were sent by the KRG land use planner.

### **Municipal Planning, Expansion Plans and Technical Assistance Program**

- Preliminary version of the master plan for Kangirsuk was presented for feedback to the NV in December;
- Preparation of interview questions for Inuit elders to inform the community master plan process was finalized; questions and supporting materials shared with Kangirsuk;
- Preliminary draft of the community master plans of Tasiujaq and Puvirnituk were received in December and January;
- Continuation of the finalization and harmonization of the community master plans based on comments received for the following communities: Kuujjuaraapik, Ivujivik, Kangiqsujaq, Kangirsuk, Inukjuak and Quaqtaq;

- Public consultations about the community master plan was held in Puvirnituk between February 5-9;
- Initial steps for planning the community consultations about the community master plans to be held in Tasiujaq and Kangirsuk in April;
- Meeting was held in December with the Nunavik Land Holding Corporation Association to define the requirements for the interactive platform of planning tools and permit emissions;
- Technical assistance was provided to Puvirnituk, Inukjuak and Kangiqsualujjuaq for the attribution of civic numbers;
- Technical assistance was provided to Kangiqsualujjuaq, Salluit, Umiujaq, Puvirnituk, Inukjuak, Ivujivik, Kangiqsujuaq and Kuujjuaq for analyzing and planning new construction projects.

## **PROTECTED AREAS**

- Participated in an information session on December 20<sup>th</sup> on the Québec plan for the definition of a new protected area status: the Indigenous-Led Protected Areas;
- The KRG responded to the MELCCFP consultation on the development of the Nature Plan by stating that the Nature Plan should take place solely and directly with the region's stakeholders, in order to have an action plan that is specific and appropriate to Nunavik, in which only relevant targets meeting regional development needs will be selected.

## **20% Protected Areas**

- Received the final report and summary version for phase one of the consultations on protected areas in Nunavik from the consultant. Documents will be translated and then shared with the communities and organizations;
- Holding Advisory Committee meetings to plan phase two for consultations on protected areas in Nunavik that should start in June;
- Specific Agreement to preserve the Cambrien Lake / Nachicapau Lake / Fort Mackenzie (Waskaikinis) Areas:
  - Participated in a meeting on December 13<sup>th</sup> of the subcommittee on the search for alternatives to hydroelectric power development in the area covered by the Agreement;
  - Participated in a meeting on January 25<sup>th</sup> of the subcommittee on the implementation of specific commitments regarding mining activities in the Nachicapau Lake Area;
  - Participated in working sessions with the Naskapi Nation of Kawawachikamach and the MELCCFP representatives to produce Cambrien / Nachicapau Status Report.

## **Park projects**

- Participation in the 12<sup>th</sup> meeting of Iluliliq National Park project held in Salluit on December 5 and 6:
  - A temporary suspension of the granting of mining titles in the consensual zones between the Working Group and the Government of Québec of the study area has been granted;
  - Members agree to send a letter to the owners of the mining claims that are within the study area asking them to withdraw those claims;
  - A Working Group letter and resolutions in response to the Government of Quebec proposed boundaries for the park project is being drafted; requesting to consider the 2015 study area;
  - Specific information tools related to the park project are being finalized.

## 5. PARKS

### General

- 2024 marks Nunavik Parks 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary. A consultant was hired for the coordination of services for the series of events planned this year. A logo has been created for the occasion;
- Winter and summer 2024 packages were launched with a new visual;
- We took out a media placement in Nunatsiaq.com to promote Nunavik Parks Beneficiaries Access Initiative which facilitates access to the parks for beneficiaries;
- Nunavik Parks was in the spotlight at the 23rd Belgian Festival *Plaisirs d'hiver*. From November 24 to December 31, 2023, the City of Brussels welcomed more than four million visitors.
- Nunavik Parks is now a member of the Société des Musées Québécois (SMQ). This allows interpretation centers to benefit from professional support in the museology and interpretation field and gives Nunavik Parks visibility through their online space on the SMQ website;
- Memberships with Tourisme Autochtone Québec, Nunavik Tourism Association, Leave no Trace Canada, Alliance de l'Industrie Touristique, Aventure Écotourisme Québec are being renewed for 2024;
- Nunavik Parks did a presentation at the Annual General Meeting of Nunavik Tourism Association on February 2;
- A public call for tender for helicopter services was launched in January;
- One of our Conservation Specialists participated in a workshop on future implementation of Atanniuvik;
- The Maintenance Technician and Project Manager travelled to communities and met with all parks to plan maintenance work and infrastructure projects for 2024;
- A Nunavik Parks management meeting was held on January 31 to discuss 2024 budget and objectives, safety in the parks and Nunavik Parks' 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary;
- Agreement with Nurrayt has been renewed. This collaboration allows Nunavik's youth to build and develop a strong cultural identity and a sense of belonging;
- The Project Manager resigned recently and the hiring process is underway as is the process for a safety Technician.

### Pingualuit

- There were no visitors in the park and 98 at the visitor center during this period;
- The harmonization committee meeting was held on November 20. Some subjects discussed included a presentation of conservation work results for 2023, presentation of upcoming research projects, summary of summer operations, visitors' statistics, construction projects at the park, upgrading of the exhibit room, rezoning of Pingualuit park and Nunavik Park's 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary;
- Two education and cultural projects managers from Montreal's Insectarium visited at the end of November to meet with three elders and a park's employee to find out what they know about insects in Nunavik. Parks employees also went to Arsaniq school to do presentations in secondary classes;
- The Director and the Visitor Experience Officer went to Salluit at the beginning of December to meet with Iluiliq National Park working group to do a presentation on Pingualuit operations;
- Igloo building workshop for wardens and helpers took place at the beginning of February. Wardens from Tursujuq park came to Pingualuit to participate in the workshop;

- A cabin was relocated to the lot near the Pingualuit office. The plan is to have the cabin renovated this Fall so it can be used as a transit;
- SEG permit for Pingualuit was renewed, granting educational permits annually to fish during the winter for non-beneficiaries on four lakes in the park. The number of permits issued in the winter remains marginal, and only three fish were caught last winter;
- Matilita Tukkiapik resigned from her position as Administrative Technician, the hiring is underway.

### **Parc national Kuururjuaq**

- There were no visitors in the park and 26 at the visitor center during this period;
- The harmonization committee meeting was held in Kangiqsualujjuaq on November 22. Subjects discussed included a presentation of conservation work results for 2023, presentation of upcoming research projects, summary of summer operations and infrastructure works, visitors' statistics and Nunavik Park's 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary;
- WHMIS online training was undertaken by wardens, operations coordinator and director;
- Our Operations Coordinator along with two wardens and an SST (semi-skilled trade) student went to Qurlutuarjuq to assess the camp and to clear the runway;
- Parc national Kuururjuaq was represented at the Bye Bye Show, a review of the year's cultural, social and political highlights. It is broadcasted on Radio-Canada television, and attracted 4.5 million viewers;
- In accordance with the Kativik Environmental Quality Commission, our request for a modification of the certificate of authorization was approved by the MELCCFP. The request included the construction of a cabin, pit toilet, fuel shelter, weather station, installation of new domes and an emergency shelter. The purpose is to improve the touristic offer, improve safety and facilitate the operations and the logistic in the park;
- The educational fact sheets project is now completed for Parc national Kuururjuaq. This scientific and cultural documentation about the park is now available for consultation at the main pavilion in Kangiqsualujjuaq and at the park's cabins;
- A conservation and education specialist is setting up a master project with the CEN and UQAR to study the 2022 fire in the Koroc valley and the regeneration (or not) of this residual boreal forest;
- A conservation and education specialist is assisting the meetings of the research group Cariboo Ungava, and supporting the caribou survey in the Torngats (planned for March 2024).

### **Parc national Ulittaniujalik**

- The harmonization committee meeting was held in Kawawachikamach at the Nation's office on November 23<sup>rd</sup>. Some of the subjects discussed included a presentation on infrastructure works, including the future camps to be built at Qamaniualuq and the future park pavilion in Kuujjuaq. Other subjects discussed were conservation work results for 2023 and Nunavik Parks' 20<sup>th</sup> anniversary. In the evening, a community dinner was organized at the community center. The Director talked about Ulittaniujalik: when it was created, where the gateways are, why and how it was created. There were discussions on the future exhibition to be developed in Kawawachikamach. Question or comments were welcomed. Newer generation and many elders were present at the time. The members of the Harmonization Committee members visited the community of Kawawachikamach on the second day before returning to Kangiqsualujjuaq and Kuujjuaq;
- Conservation and education specialists are setting up an Imalirijit inventory project of the freshwater mammals in Kuururjuaq and Ulittaniujalik (for summer 2024).

### **Parc national Tursujuq**

- The park has just signed the contract for a permanent exhibition in Kuujjuaraapik, which will open this year. This comes after the MELCCFP gave its approval in early January to the concept proposed by the firm selected for the project.
- The park bought a lime-grass basket from Great Britain, to be showcased in its permanent exhibition in Kuujjuaraapik. This basket was made by Louisa Angatookalook from Kuujjuaraapik in 1974 and will celebrate the importance of protecting and repatriating Inuit artifacts;
- Administrative technicians took a training on how to use a qullik with Helen Tooktoo in December. The lighting of the qullik can be done with school groups, during activities at the pavilion and with visitors;
- Davidee Naluktuk was hired as a seasonal warden at the beginning of November.
- The hiring of a Visitor Experience Officer in Kuujjuaraapik/Whapmagoostui is underway.
