



## **RENEWABLE RESOURCES, ENVIRONMENT, LANDS and PARKS department**

### **ACTIVITY REPORT February to May 2021**

Mandates and responsibilities:

- Fishing and Trapping Support Program: overall program administration, technical assistance to the Community programs and management of the regional program;
  - Uumajuit Wardens Program: wildlife protection on the land in the marine sectors;
  - Environmental Program: technical assistance to the Northern Villages, environmental monitoring, research, climate change and environmental projects;
  - Land Use Planning: technical assistance to the Northern Villages and regional planning;
  - National Parks development and operation.

#### **1. INUIT HUNTING, FISHING AND TRAPPING SUPPORT PROGRAM**

- Country food purchased for 2020 in total was 2.5M of which \$650,000 were from the Cost-of-Living program;
- The second payments to the Community HSP's from the Harvester's support funding totalling \$ 225,00 was made at the end of March;
- Puvirnitug HSP boat should be delivered latest by the end of September, all boat inspections are suspended due to travel restrictions;
- The Umiujaq HSP Community Freezer will be delivered in the fall of this year. And by the end of 2022, all freezers should be done. Inspections of the freezers will resume once the travel restrictions are over;
- Following community visit in Quaqtac, it was decided to build a new freezer in 2022 instead of renovating the existing one;
- Meat cutting courses were delivered in Kuujuaq, Inukjuak and Tasiujaq;
- Assistance for the replacement of lost hunting equipment was approved by the Executive committee to assist a hunter from Salluit;
- Visits were made to Aupaluk, Quaqtac, Tasiujaq and Inukjuak;
- Following the auditors reports on the community programs, the HSP Annual report 2020 is being drafted;
- Peter Annahatak is the new HSP Regional Agent, based in Kangirsuk.

#### **2. UUMAJUIT WARDENS PROGRAM**

- As of the end of April, the wardens completed 306 patrol-days in 2021 as well 1 day of search and rescue assistance;
- Weekly telephone meetings with Quebec Wildlife Protection Officers (MFFP) as well as DFO representatives and all wardens/technicians are active and ongoing;
- Statistics reporting on Beluga sightings and harvests along with monitoring of hunting on a daily basis, ongoing with each warden/technician;
- Recruitment for a warden in Quaqtac on going;

- Covid 19 guidelines being followed by all wardens/technicians;
- Joint Patrol with MFFP by warden from Kuujuaq as well planning on more joint patrols with MFFP and DFO;
- Yearly Refresher courses, 2 days, with DFO completed with all the wardens and technicians;
- Yearly Refresher courses, 1 day, with MFFP, planned in May for all the wardens and technicians;
- Participated in meetings of the KRG/DFO Liaison committee in February and April;
- The AAROM 2020-21 agreement with DFO for Uumajuit Wardens Program funding of \$ 480,000 was signed and the draft AAROM 2021-25 agreement is being reviewed;
- An agreement with MFFP for Uumajuit Wardens supplementary funding of \$ 300,000 for the Uumajuit Wardens Program was signed by KRG and MFFP at the end of March;
- The report of the 2020-21 Nunavik Indigenous Program, a joint KRG/Makivik Initiative, is being drafted;
- As part of the Nunavik Indigenous Guardians Initiative, the Wardens continue to document and report observations on environmental and climate changes on the land;

### **3. ENVIRONMENT**

#### **Residual Material Management**

- Nunavik Residual Material Management Plan 2021-2027: Plan under revision by Recyc-Québec and KRG;
- Participated to the 8<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Nunavik Waste Management working group in February;
- Management of the residual hazardous materials stockpile site cleanup program: clean up activities will take place in 6 villages : Inukjuak, Akulivik, Salluit, Quaqtac, Kangirsuk and Kangiqsualujuaq;
- Participated in collaboration with the KEAC to a meeting of the provincial joint committee on the modernization of the returnable containers system and to a meeting of the provincial working group on the modernization of the selective collection system;
- Participated to the BAPE (Environmental Public Hearing Bureau) on ultimate waste and submitted a brief to the Government of Quebec in May regarding the status of the ultimate waste in Nunavik;
- Metal Recycling project: Kangirsuk has been selected for 2021. Planning has been approved by MELCC and a project manager has been hired;

#### **Spill Management**

- Continued the monitoring and follow-up of hydrocarbon spill reports, with added support to the regional organizations in regards to environment regulations and clean-up procedures;
- During this period, 23 spills have been reported from mining companies and regional organizations;
- A major oil spill occurred at the municipal garage of Ivujivik: on-site assistance has been given by a KRG environmental technician, a representative of the MELCC and a private firm in order to limit the contamination. More actions are planned in the coming months to finalize the decontamination process.

#### **Quarry and Borrow pits**

- Land-use planning and Environnement section met with the Northern Village of Quaqtac in March to discuss the issue of natural granular material and potential solutions;
- Environnement section and MPW department met with the northern Village of Kangirsuk in April to discuss the potential new gravel pit sites.

### **Climate Change Adaptation and Monitoring**

- Followed-up with funding recipients and generally acted as the liaison between the *Climate Change Preparedness in the North (CCPN)* program and Nunavik;
- Participated in bi-monthly conference calls with CCPN staff and Climate Change Adaptation Liaisons from other Northern regions;
- Supported working group and community consultations related to the Nunavik Climate Change Strategy, led by Makivik. Discussions with most NVs took place in February to identify communities priorities. Strategy to be developed by late-fall 2021;
- Participated in a virtual workshops hosted by Environment & Climate Change Canada (ECCC) Indigenous Guardians program;
- Participated in a Plain Language Course delivered by Wordsmith Associates and organized by CCPN;
- Trail monitoring project, maintenance work have been done in April on the cameras in the area of Kangirsuapik 50 km north of Kangirsujuaq;
- Participated in a virtual meeting organized by the MELCC in May, on the 2021-2030 Provincial Climate Change Plan and the specific actions for Nunavik;

### **Environmental Research**

- Nunavik Regional Research Authority (NRRRA) steering committee: 3 monthly meetings for the assessment and planning for its implementation;
- Participated in a meeting of the Nunavik Nutrition and Health Committee held in March to review NCP funding proposals;
- Pan-arctic research program from Environment Canada (EC): the “Persistent Organic Pollutant” and Mercury samplers were changed in April . The sampling site is located about 25 km north of Kuujjuaq.
- The KRG environmental technician and Kangiqsujuaq Uumajuit Warden have provided technical assistance to Canadian Royalties for sampling of snow core (dust analysis) normally done by their staff in April. Due to COVID restriction the mine have not been able to proceed to their 2020 and 2021 mandatory snow sampling in the vicinity of Kangiqsujuaq;
- Participated in the 1<sup>st</sup> steering committee meeting of the new Research Chair for Nunavik Permafrost on April 9 with University Laval and Center for Northern Study;
- In collaboration with MPW, participated to the 1<sup>st</sup> meeting of the Water research strategic committee in Nunavik with University of Ottawa and focusing on the protection of water sources in Nunavik;

### **Regional Environment**

- Attended the 167<sup>th</sup> meeting of the Kativik Environmental Advisory Committee in March; where Recyc-Québec was invited to hear the concerns and the needs in terms of residual materials management in Nunavik as well as the challenges of setting up new recycling programs in the region;
- Annual meeting with the MELCC regional office in May : MPW, Transport and the Environment section are sharing information about environmental monitoring, results, reports, environmental compliance of infrastructure, training needs and other environmental questions that can be raised

*The regional office of the MELCC is the main interlocutor in term of providing environmental authorizations for projects in the region, this annual meeting aim to exchange information and increase the communication with them;*

- Participated in the initial meeting of Transport Canada - Regulatory Roundtable with other Nunavik organizations in March to develop regulations with Indigenous organizations towards more effective and inclusive regulations for marine safety and environmental protection;
- Collaborated with the Civil security department on the follow-up with the community of Kuujjuaraapik in regards of the landslide (8 km east of the village on the northern shore of the Great Whale river).

Caniapiscou watershed abandoned outfitting camp clean-up:

- Finalize the annual report for the Caniapiscou abandoned outfitting camps project;

Nunavik Abandoned Mineral Exploration Restauration:

- Workers from Kangiqsualujjuaq were hired to transport by snowmobile an estimated of 3 000 kg of waste from Weymouth site to the community in February and March with the environmental technician;
- The Agreement with Canadian Royalties, FRAN and MERN was amended to include an in-kind contribution from Canadian Royalties for the NAMERS project. This contribution targets the clean-up and remediation of the Gerido sites. This new version of the agreement will extend the NAMERS project until March 2024;
- Presentation at the Mining Workshop 2021 of the NAMERS history of projects and achievements since the beginnings in 2007;
- The annual report 2020-2021 was completed and presented to the Steering committee in May;

Abandoned USA military site by Indian House Lake, on the George River:

- The MELCC has accepted to add the site on the “Passif environnemental”. This will be official in June and will help accessing funding to do remediation works of the site.

#### 4. LAND USE PLANNING

##### **Regional Planning**

- During this period, 9 projects of Land use occupations were approved;
- Collaboration on the COVID “Nunavik fieldwork guideline 2021” implemented by the NREPAC/ROC;
- Participation at the “National urban and Land use planning strategy” consultation with MAMH in April; this strategy can be used in the future as a lever to help the KRG modify the articles of the *Kativik act* regarding land use planning;
- Presentation of the “Land Use Processus : Update on regional regulations” at the Mining Workshop 2021; this presentation to mining industry aim to explain the processus behind the Kativik Master Plan revision and the future zoning bylaw for the Kativik region/Nunavik;

##### **Municipal Planning, Expansion Plans and Technical Assistance Program**

- Technical assistance was provided to Quaqtq and Ivujivik concerning specific construction projects and to Kuujjuaraapik and Inukjuak for zoning bylaw questions;
- Collaborated with MPW and other organizations for the planning of the 2021 social housing construction season;
- Visited Quaqtq community for the update of their masterplan and for planning the new expansion area;
- Collaborated as part of the advisory committee to BNQ Risk-Based Approach for Community

Planning in Northern Regions new standard;

- Participated to Nunavik Climate Change Strategy meeting in April organised by Makivik, during this meeting were presented the outcomes of the consultations concerning the Infrastructure & Community services such as maintaining and protecting built infrastructure, maintaining essential services, protecting Nunavimmiut health, wellbeing and culture and advance Inuit self-determination and equity;

### **Geomatics**

- Collaboration with the MERN for the orthophotos and lidar acquisition of all the communities of the Ungava coast that will take place during the summer 2021;
- Produced maps for:
  - Tursujuk park;
  - Community basemaps for Akulivik, Kangiqsujuaq, Kangirsuk, Kuujjuaq and Quaqtac;
  - Snowmobile race between Kuujjuaq and Tasiujaq;
  - Locating the landslide near Kuujjuaraapik/Whapmagoostui;

## **5. PROTECTED AREAS**

### **20% Protected Areas**

- Draft with the Advisory Committee a consensual proposition regarding the scope of the consultation project on protected areas in Nunavik;
- Preparation of work plans with the 2 subcommittees regarding alternatives to hydroelectric power development and mining activities in the Nachicapau Lake Area in the context of the Specific Agreement to preserve the Cambrien Lake / Nachicapau Lake / Fort Mackenzie (Waskaikinis) Areas.

## **6. PARK PROJECTS**

### **Parc National Iluiliq Project**

- Working Group meeting for Iluiliq National Park Project on April 13 in Ivujivik:
  - Updated the members on the progress of the project and informed on the next steps to come;
  - followed-up on MERN's position on the study area according to their fieldwork' results;
  - presented landing strip assessment project planned for summer 2021 within the study area;

## **7. PARKS**

### **General**

- Considering the pandemic, Nunavik Parks remained closed to visitors from outside Nunavik. Nunavik Parks is dedicating its efforts regionally to offer activities to Nunavimmiut (youth cultural camps, elders, students, autonomous visitors, short packages, etc.);
- Partnership renewed with Nurrait students program;
- Nunavik Parks Liaison committee meeting with MFFP held on April 29, topics discussed included park operations 2020, park operations planning 2021, park infrastructures and landing strips;
- Biweekly videoconference meetings with the Kuujjuaq parks team as well as biweekly videoconference meetings with park's management are ongoing;
- Nunavik Parks web site now has a responsive version (desktop, mobile and tablet formats) and has been updated to showcase parks short packages for 2021 summer (departures from

Nunavik only);

- Promotion for local departures (Nunavik only) has started on May 1<sup>st</sup> and reservation for weekend packages is planned for mid June.
- Alternative itineraries have been developed with departures from parks' adjacent communities (by boat or ATV);
- As part of parks' "Inuit video series", a first video capsule has been completed showcasing Parc national des Pingualuit Director Mary A. Pilurttut. The video will be shared on social media shortly;
- Brief was sent to Transport Canada to request the modifications to the previous requirements of a minimum runway length of 1000 feet. Effective May 3, 2021: the runways at the Qurlurtuajuq camp (KUU), Upper Koroc access (KOR) and Lake Manarsulik camps (LAF) are operational with minimal conditions.

### **Parc national des Pingualuit**

- There were 62 visitors in the park and 125 at the visitor centre during this period;
- Nunavik Parks Youth Ambassador pilot project is projected to start in June 2021, youth will be hired to inspire other youth to learn more about the park, work closely with the elders and visitors at the school and special events at the park. The youth will also share their experiences, passion and interest in nature, history and more in depth of the Inuit culture;
- Presentations on Inuit tattoos to 4 Arsaniq school high school classes;
- Meeting with Kangirsujuaq Tourism Adventures to discuss plans and activities in the community for visitors coming to Qulusuttalik and Tursukattak alternate summer destinations should Manarsulik airstrip be not accessible;
- Canadian Royalties employees went to Pingualuit to do environmental monitoring in March.

### **Parc national Kuururjuaq**

- There were 30 visitors in the park and 33 at the visitor centre during this period;
- One group of students stayed for two nights at Quurlutuarjuq camp;
- Nurrait students program (winter expedition) travelled in March accompanied with local guides;
- Two winter packages of 6 visitors from Nunavik delivered in Quurlutuarjuq sector;
- Employees transport construction material to the Quurlutuarjuq camp and remove residual materials (4).

### **Parc national Ulittaniujalik**

- There were no visitors in the park during this period;
- Planning is underway for future Park Infrastructures;
- Exploratory trip was made by snowmobile to Tasirlaq Lake area to assess accessibility, tourism and infrastructure potential.

### **Parc national Tursujuq**

- There were 44 visitors in the park and 50 at the visitor centre during this period;
- The Park Harmonization Committee Meeting was held in Kuujjuaraapik/Whapmagoostui week of April 19. There was also a meeting with Inuit and Cree to discuss a future exhibit to be located in Kuujjuaraapik and Whapmagoostui;
- Approval of MFFP requests for research in the park on muskox and caribou;
- Presentation on Parks Operations, Activities and Expeditions to the Mayor and Municipal Councillors of Umiujaq;
- Planning with Cree tallyman from Whapmagoostui Mr. Richard Petagumskum for trail mapping to Wiyâshâkimî.
