ESUMA is a program funded by the Kativik Regional Government with Nunavik-based organizations committed to supporting academic perseverance and educational success through the mobilization of all Nunavimmiut. Its initiatives are aimed at increasing the graduation rate and qualifications of Nunavimmiut. ESUMA also operates a funding program dedicated to supporting projects that encourage students to stay in school, graduate from high school, and pursue higher education.

The Kativik Regional Government provides comprehensive public services to Nunavimmiut under the James Bay and Northern Quebec Agreement (1978). The KRG is governed by a Council made up of 17 elected municipal members from 14 northern Nunavik communities, an elected Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson, and the Chief of the Naskapi First Nation of Kawawachikamach.
