New Centre Construction Project

Isuarsivik postpones the beginning of the construction to 2021 and the opening to 2023

Kuujjuaq (September 9, 2020) — It is with great sorrow that the Isuarsivik Regional Recovery Centre ("Isuarsivik") announces a one-year delay for the construction of its new Kuujjuaq facility. The construction of this new Centre, which will triple its accommodation capacity, was scheduled to begin in the summer of 2020. In order to limit the spread of the COVID-19, the Municipality of Kuujjuaq has adopted measures to reduce the risk of propagation, including a ban on employing more than five workers from outside Nunavik for all construction projects. For this reason, the contractor, Les Constructions Pépin et Fortin Inc., who was awarded the contract for the construction of the main building in April, will only be shipping certain materials and equipment required for the construction of the building, which will officially begin in the spring of 2021.

Despite the impacts of such change in the construction schedule, the organization makes every effort to be resilient and flexible. Indeed, Isuarsivik's Board of Directors and management team wish to recognize the good work of the regional organizations in managing the crisis of COVID-19. "We respect the decision of the Northern Village of Kuujjuaq's council members and we understand that it reflects the concerns and preoccupations of the overall community" said Dave Forrest, Isuarsivik's Chair. "It is imperative for our community organization to nurture healthy relationships and support community leaders. In this sense, we thank the council members for taking the time to listen to our opinion and to try to find a solution in this complex situation. We are also hopeful that other regional, provincial, and federal partners will understand our situation and offer additional support for this crucial project," adds Dave.

This heartbreaking announcement comes at a time when the resources for assistance in the region remain more essential than ever. "Following a prolonged period of isolation, the need for recovery services and resources is growing in the region for people who not only want to stop consuming, but also aim to reduce the amount and frequency of use. In fact, the imposed limit on alcohol sales in the communities during the pandemic has allowed us to witness what our communities could look like with less exposure to alcohol abuse. Above all, the pandemic exposed us to a significant increase in requests for guidance and

support from Nunavimmiut, whose isolation weighs heavily on their mental health. For them, we will intensify our efforts to minimize the impact of the construction delay caused by the pandemic and to offer our new services as soon as possible," declares Isuarsivik's Executive Director, Alicia Aragutak.

"We are disappointed for the families in need who are eagerly awaiting the new family recovery program, which can only be offered in our new facility. However, I want to reassure the population that our 42-day recovery program will be maintained in our current premises with the highest standards of quality and safety until the opening of the new centre," adds Alicia. While the organization has recently reopened its administrative section, services remain suspended until further notice in order to implement government recommendations, tailored for the region, for inpatient facilities. However, Isuarsivik is confident that at least one cycle will be offered by the end of this year to the women who submit their applications. Moreover, it is possible to apply to the centre at any time via isuarsivik.ca/application-form. All applications received are added to the waiting list and will be seriously evaluated for future cycles.

Positive News

Recognized for its efficiency and determination, the Isuarsivik team has already initiated communication with its partners. The goal is to secure support and funding to deal with possible additional cost related to the postponement of the project caused by COVID-19. In June, Indigenous Services Canada responded positively by confirming an extra contribution of \$500,000 to the \$6M already allocated for the construction project. "Canada takes seriously the issues of substance use and mental health that affect the lives of Nunavimmiut, especially in the context of COVID-19. When the pandemic began, the Inuit communities of Nunavik adopted exceptional isolation measures to better support their health and mental well-being. The additional funding for the construction of the new Isuarsivik Regional Recovery Centre will help Nunavik Inuit partners to develop and deliver high-quality, culturally appropriate health services during COVID-19 as well as to address the many challenges ahead related to the postponement of construction. I do share your disappointment at this news but am glad that Canada can do its part to support the health of Nunavimmiut," stated the Honourable Marc Miller, Minister of Indigenous Services.

Furthermore, the new Isuarsivik's Continued Care Services Department reacted quickly to the current pandemic by developing a virtual care project that would allow guests who have completed the healing program to obtain remote post-treatment follow-up. Through its new *Rapid Response for Remote Communities* emergency fund, the **MakeWay Foundation** (formerly Tides) offered \$30,000 to Isuarsivik to take the first steps, becoming the lead funder for this important initiative. Other partners will be added by the end of the year to ensure that the project gets off the ground as soon as possible, with the utmost safety consideration for both employees and guests.
