The KRG Council is made up of one appointed representative from each of the 14 northern villages of the Kativik Region. The chief of the Naskapi village of Kawawachikamach is *ex officio* a member of the Council.

The *Act respecting Northern Villages and the Kativik Regional Government* requires the Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson to be fully allocated to the service of the KRG. Therefore, with the appointment Vice-Chairperson Lucy Kumarluk to the Executive Committee, a new Council Member will be appointed to represent the village of Umiujaq.

The first sitting of the newly appointed KRG Council will take place from Monday, March 7th to Thursday, March 10th, 2022. Proceedings of the regular sittings of the KRG Council are broadcast live in all the communities on Taqramiut Nipingat Inc.
